Membership:

This metric is important to both the local Lodge and to the Grand Lodge. We have kept the Plus One Program started by MWPGM Steve Zimmerman going the last few years and although we did not make overall growth during this Grand Lodge year, we are very close. We adopted the membership chip to dive potential candidates to the beafreemson.org website and it has been helpful. The membership chip was at no cost to the Grand Lodge. Four Lodges had growth. Eagle Rock #19 Plus 3, Silver City Plus 1, Kamiah #56 Plus 1. And Initial Point #98 Plus 1. Lodges with zero net losses totaled 17 with 24 Lodges reporting losses. From the chart below you can see that we have more men in the pipeline that those we lost during the last Grand Lodge year. Candidate, EA, and FC are potentially 179 members. If we can mentor, coach, and develop these men to become masons we can offset the historical losses and have a positive year.

The Tables above are generated by Grandview based upon the information reported by the Lodges and reporting from beafreemason.org to the Grand Secretary. Grand Lodge Offices have this view (Grand Lodge Dashboard) when logging into Grand View. I directed the Grand Secretary to include screenshots of this page to be included in the Newsletter. Due to Grandview current read only limitations this page is not available to non-Grand Lodge Offices. The Dashboard is an effective tool that should be more readily available. This dashboard also permits the user to search for a brother by first or last name and obtain Telephone, email, addresses and other membership information that greatly reduces burned on the Grand Secretary in providing this information when requested.

Finances:

Finances as of the writing of this report is that no draws for 2024 have been made at this time from investments. This is a result of 2 factors. First, we did not hire a Grand Clerk. Secondly, we have closely monitored and controlled our expenditures. A draw will need to be made after the annual communication to cover the remaining outlays for the year. To better report to the brethren the Grand Treasure and Grand Secretary have established revenue and expense accounts for the Annual Communication to use this year and the following years. These have historically been passed though general accounts and historically been harder to unravel using previous accounting methods. As of this writing of this report the final FY 2023 accounting has not been

reported. In general, for FY 2023 we were under recovered and underspent. Care in calculation of Lodges assessment is critical in ensuring a balanced proposed budget and assessment. This requires that the Lodges accurately complete and timely submit returns to the Grand Secretary as this information is critical to complete this process by the March Grand Lodge Planning meeting and later submission to the Lodges.

State of Finical Audit:

As of the writing of this report we had not yet received the Audit report. The elected Grand Lodge Officers have been directed to find a new CPA and/or Firm.

State of Investments:

Investments have finally returned from the low in 2022 to previous levels. We still need to work on increasing our Endowment funds to offset the Assessment to the Lodge.

At the 156th Annual Communication after reports from Accounts/Finance and the Investment Committees were presented questions on when the investments of the Grand Lodge would be able to support significant reductions in the assessments were proffered. The response from the committee was between 3-4 million dollars total in the Relief and Endowment funds. Cost of operations has increased due to both inflationary cost of living pressure and office operations program expenditures. The need to provide a long-term funding raising program was identified to assist in increasing the Grand Lodge endowment investment funds.

Legacy Endowment Program:

Review of other North American Grand Lodges and Appendant Bodies long-term fund-raising programs identified a successful program that had been implemented in other jurisdictions and appendant bodies. Discussion with existing Grand Lodge of Idaho Officers lead to identification of the Legacy Endowment Program for the Grand Lodge of Idaho. This program is implemented at no cost to the Grand Lodge (Angel Donnor) with no future expenditures except for a nominal restock fee for each award \$20.

The corpus of the funds raised, and investment returns will be held in reserve until the Legacy Endowment Fund Investments reach \$300,000. At that time the investments returns can be drawn in accordance with the Code and Digest limits for the Endowment Fund. A fillable pdf application for the Grand Lodge AF & AM of Idaho Legacy Endowment Program can be found on the Grandview resource page. Payments of \$100 will be tracked and as each award level is reached the award will be made to the individual or Lodge. The award levels are Supporter \$500, Patron \$1000, and Benefactor \$5000. The pdf Application can be found on Grand View Resources, MM, near the bottom Grand Lodge Legacy Endowment, Legacy Endowment Application. I challenge the brothers that can support this program. I know there are 70 Brothers that can meet this challenge. The application permits \$100 payments to the Legacy Endowment Program.



Grand Lodge Office Building:

Current economic factors make the sale of the Grand Lodge Office building undesirable currently. The Grand Lodge does need to address the maintenance and upkeep. Overall, the building is sound. Future expenses for roof replacement, flooring, interior paint, and reconfiguring the layout to permit the Grand Master to have a working office need to be addressed and financed.

Grand Treasurer Report 2023-2024

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Idaho The Grand Treasurer duties and responsibilities are outlined in Section 305 of the Idaho Masonic Code and Digest. While completing these tasks as acting Grand Treasurer I have worked primarily with Brother Steve Hall, RW Grand Secretary and served on all the committees assigned to me as RW Grand Treasurer.

All monies have been received from the Grand Secretary, my receipt has been given and monies paid out in accordance with the approved budget in dual control with the RW Grand Secretary. All bills received against the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Idaho have been recorded in QuickBooks and checks subsequently drawn in payment of the same in a timely manner. The Grand Secretary and I have met regularly to ensure the bills are paid and deposits are timely made. We also have frequent discussions concerning the finances of the Grand Lodge.

The Grand Lodge checking and money market accounts are with D.L. Evans Bank and the Grand Lodge Permanent Relief, Interest Relief and Endowment accounts funds are invested with Wells Fargo Financial Advisors.

Current Budget vs Actual, as of July 31, 2024

Trustees of Grand Lodge Relief Fund Committee Report

During the period from Oct 1, 2023 to July 31, 2024:

- \$2.155.50 was deposited into the Permanent Relief Account. This included a \$1,000.00 donation and \$1,055.50 from the \$0.50 per member per capita assessment. The Permanent Relief Account as July 31, 2024 is \$424,654.00
- \$2,473.00 was deposited into the Endowment Account. This included \$373.00 collected at the 2023 GL Memorial Service and \$2,111.00 from the \$1.00 per member per capita assessment. Endowment Fund Account principal as of July 31, 2024 is \$284,425.00.
- During the 2023-2024 Grand Lodge year MWGM Gary established a Legacy Endowment program and a donation of \$5,000.00 was received. These funds were invested in the Wells Fargo Endowment Account

REPORT OF GRAND SECRETARY 2023-2024

(Referred to the Committees of Jurisprudence and Accounts and Finances)

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters, and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of Idaho:

It is with great respect and humility that I submit this report, marking the completion of my first year as Grand Secretary, a role I was elected to at the 156th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Idaho. The past year has been a period of both challenge and growth, and it is my sincere hope that I have served the members of this Grand Lodge with honor and dedication. It is a privilege to provide this update on the recent developments and the collaborative efforts that have been made to ensure the effective operation of our Grand Lodge office.

Throughout the year, we have made commendable progress in several areas, while in others, we have maintained the status quo. There remains significant work to be done to enhance the efficiency of the Grand Lodge Office. Now that both Brother Art and I have observed all the processes over the course of a year, we are in a better position to identify which processes need improvement and which are functioning well.

I must again emphasize the complexity of the tasks performed within the Grand Lodge Office. Many of these responsibilities are unique and are only carried out once annually. Mastery of these duties often requires hands-on experience within the office. Despite the challenges, our combined efforts have allowed us to maintain the smooth functioning of the Grand Lodge, ensuring that we have arrived at this Grand Session with our obligations fulfilled.

In my commitment to the success of this office, I have continued to work long hours, even when external commitments have required me to be away from the office. During those times, I remained steadfast in fulfilling the responsibilities of the Grand Secretary's office remotely. MWB Art and I are fully dedicated to ensuring that the Grand Lodge office continues to operate within the parameters set forth by the Grand Lodge Code and Digest, and to continuously improving our processes.

I wish to convey once more the magnitude and diversity of the workload handled by this office. The role of Grand Secretary is indeed a 24/7 commitment. The office serves as the central hub for all communications and inquiries from other Grand Jurisdictions and plays an integral role in supporting the operational needs of both the Grand Lodge and our individual Lodges.

The duties and responsibilities of the Grand Secretary are outlined in Section 306 of the Idaho Masonic Code and Digest. In fulfilling these tasks, I have worked closely with the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers (both Elected and Appointed), Lodge Secretaries, Past Grand Masters, and all the committees to which I have been assigned. Monthly financial reports have been prepared and sent to the Accounts and Finance Committee and the Elected Grand Lodge Officers.

Monthly investment reports have been received from Wells Fargo Advisors and summary reports have been prepared and sent to the Investment Committee, Relief Committee, Pre-paid Life Committee and the Grand Lodge Officers.

The financial records for the Fiscal Year 2023 have been closed and a Financial Audit has been performed by Tarter & Associates, PA. The reports were reviewed in the Grand Lodge Planning meeting in March. And a copy of these reports has been given to the Accounts & Finance Committee for their review.

The "Idaho Secretary of State Annual Report" was submitted electronically with the New Directors/Officers updated.

The IRS Group Exemption Verification Letter for the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Idaho has been received and reviewed by the Grand Lodge Office and returned to the IRS.

Proceedings

In accordance with Regulation No. 52 of the Idaho Masonic Code and Digest, the 2023 Proceedings for the 156th Annual Communication have been prepared, printed, and distributed to each Lodge, each Grand Lodge Officer, each District Deputy Grand Master, each Past Grand Master and 10 copies to be stored in the fireproof safe in the Grand Lodge Office. Abstract of the 156th Annual Communication

George Washington Masonic National Association

Masonic Service Association

The Grand Lodge of Idaho contributed to the Masonic Service Association, according to the budget of \$250.00. A check was made out in that amount and Most Worshipful Grand Master Gary A. S. LaBruyere handed it to the Masonic Service Association representative at the Conference of Grand Masters of North America.

Grand Orator Report.

11, W∴ Grand Orator

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Honored Visitors, Brothers All – Greetings!

This is the third time I've had the privilege to address this Grand Lodge as the Grand Orator. My dear Brother Barry Newell suggested to me that such a feat is probably a record. I'm not certain whether I should take it as a compliment that three Grand Masters had confidence in my ability for this role, whether it's just blind luck that the most recent two forgot how I performed a decade ago, or whether they figured I could cause less trouble here than I usually cause when unrestrained by the purple and gold apron.

This is the first oration that I have given during the Grand Lodge session. In prior years, this speech was given at the banquet on Friday evening. Grand Master LaBruyere wished to try something new this year, so those of you who were hoping to miss the speech by skipping the banquet, well, you lost that gambit.

At first blush, it seemed that the change of venue might lend itself to a different oration than those of past years. I considered whether the change permitted me to go into some more esoteric topic than that available in mixed company, but the reality is that the oration is printed in the proceedings, which are available publicly, so in reality, the restraints remain largely the same.

The two prior orations began with a recitation of the process used to craft those speeches, and in all fairness, the same process was employed this year, and this oration starts similarly. I began by reading a couple more decades of prior orations, looking for themes or inspiration. As I noted before, the pedigree of prior orators is quite impressive, ranging from ranchers to a former governor of Idaho to accomplished artisans. The more I read, the less I was inspired with something new to say. Speeches about George Washington occupied about twenty to thirty percent of the prior orations I read; I doubted there was new ground available to plow in that field in such a limited forum. Biographies of other famous Masons were another common theme. In fact, in several years, it was difficult to find a difference between the outcome of the Grand Orator's work and that of the Grand Historian.

In prior terms, inspiration came early in the Masonic year. For the first one, Grand Master Triplett's theme of "Tell Your Story" provided my trestle board for a design. Last year, Grand Master Burger's lapel pin provided the foundation to build upon. The challenge, really, was that when I sat down to work on this oration, I kept coming back to the common elements of those two prior orations. And while I still stand by my prior words, frankly, I didn't want to simply rehash those thoughts; instead, I wanted to try to say something a little different. After all, I have a third chance to try to get it right.

Reading proceedings for several decades yields some interesting revelations. I'm blessed to have a personal library of Grand Lodge proceedings going back about 110 years or so, but I will forever be grateful that we, as a Grand Lodge, saw the wisdom in investing in the Masonic Digital Archives Project at the George Washington National Masonic Memorial. That resource permits one to quickly review the history of our fraternity in this great state and reforge our links to our past. All much easier than pulling individual dusty volumes off the shelf. There's really now no excuse for a brother, particularly those in leadership roles, whether in their lodge or the Grand Lodge, to not study the past and learn from the brethren who have preceded us. Much can be learned from our history and the words of our Masonic forefathers.

As I read the proceedings, I note that, as Yogi Berra said, it's déjà vu all over again. The Grand Lodge of Idaho has been in existence for a bit more than 150 years, and every year there has been a Grand Lodge communication of some sort, and each has a printed proceeding. No surprises there. But what is surprising is how many of them are basically the same; in other words, the challenges, the opportunities, and the responses to each, have been largely the same for a century.

What do I mean? We've been lamenting the lack of engagement in our lodges and among our members since time immemorial. Grand Masters for decades have been asking why more men aren't active in their lodges, why more brothers aren't doing the work to be Master of their lodge, and why voting delegates aren't attending the annual communication.

We've been debating the necessity of the Masters Certificate and the need to make it easier to be in the chair. And we've swung back and forth on the shifting sands of what is the right approach to ritual work in general. In the 1920s and 30s, this Grand Lodge was debating a plan to make the Grand Lecturer a full-time paid position, with a travel budget, to ensure that he could go around the state to ensure ritual excellence in all our lodges. Imagine what the per capita would need to be today to undertake such a program. Yet such was the importance of ritual excellence and ensuring that each lodge had the ability to perfect its craft, that this was being explored

by this Grand Lodge in earnest during one of the worst economic periods in American history. At other times, we have been considering various proposals to eliminate requirements for certificates or to permit ritual work to be simply read to candidates.

The build up to the creation of the Secondary Worshipful Masters Certificate was interesting. Various ideas were proposed for well over a decade, generally meeting with much resistance at this communication. The common theme was that this would yield more members able and willing to be master of their lodge. Statistically, for the ten or so years prior to the eventual adoption of the change in 1991, 2/1000 of a percent of the membership of Idaho earned a certificate. In 1970, it was 3/1000 of a percent of the members. In the ten years after the enactment of the change, the percentage hit 4/1000 of a percent three times, but the rest of the years, it was the same 2/1000 or 3/1000 of a percent. In 2012, back to 2/1000 of a percent, as it was in in 2022. I'll let you draw your own conclusions on whether the change yielded a positive outcome. My point, rather, is that it is interesting that the more things change, the more they stay the same. We're still debating the propriety and necessity of the certificates today, as our forefathers were fifty years ago.

In 1970, we had 13,475 members reported in the Grand Lodge, so that 3/1000 of a percent was 39 certificates. By 1991, we were at 8,168 members with 14 certificates; the next year, with both certificates available, the 7,917 members earned 26 certificates. Our 2,448 members earned six certificates in 2022, only one of which was a full certificate. The certificates earned stays statistically in line with the trajectory of our membership.

A more concerning data point is found in the returns of lodges. For many years, the report contained data on how many lodges conferred degrees that year, including which lodges conferred the most degrees that year.

Some years in the 1970s, there were lodges still conferring sixty-plus degrees a year. But the alarming part was the report on how many lodges conferred no degrees during the preceding year. When that data point was still being reported, it was becoming more common that more lodges were not conferring degrees than were conferring degrees. We are all too familiar with what happens to lodges when they are not conferring degrees for years at a time. Unfortunately, even though this data point hasn't been a part of the report for several years, I surmise that it hasn't gotten better given our membership trends.

So why the doom and gloom history report? For two reasons. One, I am a firm believer that you cannot change your path unless you understand where you came from. Two, I am also certain that we can learn a lot from studying and understanding the comments and proposals from the past. In many respects, the new ideas of today are the old ideas of a decade ago. Moreover, the history review informs us that the challenges and lamentations of today are the same as those of yesterday.

I believe that on many things, we need to get back to basics to change the future of this fraternity in Idaho in a positive way. In my opinion, the necessary efforts to change our path are focused on three areas.

The first is membership. This is no surprise to anyone, but we need opportunities to initiate new members into our lodges. With less than 2,200 Masons left in the Grand Lodge of Idaho, we are at a critical juncture on whether Freemasonry survives, or even exists, in Idaho. I doubt that anyone would state that their lodge is big enough or that they have enough active members. We must redouble our efforts to increase the ranks. Tools like the BeAFreemason.Org website and social media have brought a lot of new men to the portal and given them an opportunity to find us. We must be even better at following up on those leads. But even more critical than that is that we must exponentially increase our efforts to help our communities, and their members, to know we exist. Too many lodges are invisible to their community because they do little to nothing outside of their own meeting room. You can get a lot of visibility from a simple group meetup at a local restaurant or hosting a booth or game at a community event. Too many have buildings that look abandoned due to neglect and disrepair. My own lodge's building was in that condition for years. We're currently working hard to change that, and in turn, it is drawing positive attention back to the building and the fraternity it houses. I am excited to see what it will do when the new coat of paint is on and the new sign goes up.

No one needs to invent a membership program. Hundreds exist; countless ones are shared in our own proceedings, and even more are to be found in the resources available from our sister jurisdictions and affiliated orders. We simply need to use them. And be visible.

We also need to keep our members. For many years, our raisings keep pace with covering for our losses from deaths. Since none of us can control that variable, we must simply accept that we're going to lose members to that undiscovered country. But we lose far more of our membership to demits and dues suspensions. This means we have a member who is not engaged in his lodge, or maybe whose lodge wasn't engaged with him. We must undertake efforts to know our members and ensure that we are both working to be engaged with each other – lodge and brother. An active and engaged brother seldom voluntarily walks away from his lodge.

In my mind, one particularly important key to membership success is the second area – our ritual. Quite simply, every lodge owes it to every petitioner to put on the best degrees possible for him. The initiation process is meant to be a personally transformative experience. None of us have to be Oscar winning actors. But we must be proficient. Not everyone is a ritualist, I understand that. But the ritual unites us and is what creates the essence of Masonry which distinguishes us from other social and fraternal pursuits, and that common tie starts the development of our bonds as brothers. Certainly, some brothers will be drawn to ritual work and will be dynamic presenters able to do most, if not all, of the parts in our ceremonies. But other equally important

brothers will do one or two parts, however, modest, incredibly well. It takes both in a lodge, and it takes all of us in a lodge to play a part, so to speak.

Ritual competency matters. This Grand Lodge used to host ritual competitions at the annual communications. There were district ritual competitions at one time. As noted earlier, we contemplated a paid full-time Grand Lecturer. None of these exist anymore. I submit that we must implement methods, whether new ideas or old, to instill ritual excellence and ensure that each lodge has access to those who can ably perform the work so that each petitioner, our new brother, has the opportunity to experience that transformative experience.

Like many, if not most, in this room, I have been initiated into multiple bodies in the Masonic family. Their emphasis on ritual runs the full spectrum from full memorization required to reading it out of a book, often accompanied by several of those reading from the book in such a way that you wonder if they had ever even seen the ceremony before. I am particularly drawn to wanting to understand the lessons in the ceremonies, especially in how they differ from and build upon each other. But I can certainly say that my particular attachment to some is so simply because of the impact of the ceremony of initiation and the particularly impressive way in which the work was done and the lesson taught.

In other words, the ritual touched upon area three — meaning. Masonry must be meaningful. For some, the impact of the ritual provides the heart of their Masonic experience. For others, it is the opportunity to bond with their fellow men, their brothers. I frequently quip that it takes a lodge to raise a Mason. It is incumbent upon the whole of the lodge to invest time and resources into mentoring and developing a new Mason, not just the assigned coach or the top line signer. And this goes far beyond merely coaching the proficiency lessons. It extends to other social interactions. Another statement I frequently make is that brotherhood is not formed in the lodge room. At first glance, that seems odd to suggest that we don't form our bonds in the lodge since I just stated that the ritual matters to Masonry. It does matter because while the ritual experience creates our first connections, it is the time spent together outside of the lodge room which forms the fraternity. In a lodge meeting, you rarely have appropriate opportunities to talk freely and learn about one another. We have business to conduct and have norms of behavior that prohibit us from conversations on the sidelines. It's outside the lodge room, at the table before or after lodge, or at the pub, or the golf course, or riverbank, or the road trip to the next lodge over, or in the hospitality room at an event, or frankly, wherever, with your brothers that forms these bonds.

Most of my closest and dearest friends are Masons. We met in a lodge room. But it is all the time spent together outside of that room that has forged our bonds. And that is where the meaning of Masonry is discovered.

In a more mundane sense, we must ensure that our meetings are meaningful. After all, it is the meetings that provide the reason to start getting together. Ensure that your lodge's communications are as interesting as possible. They need not be just open, read minutes, lament the bills, and close. Every meeting should contain an enrichment component. Sometimes that can be Masonic education such as a paper or a short talk. But it can also be a brother sharing about his recent trip to a foreign land. Or a fly-casting demonstration on the lawn. Or a special meal before to honor someone or some event. These things provide a reason to come out to lodge and keep members looking forward to seeing what the next thing will be. But more importantly, they help to connect the dots between our brothers so they can bond over shared interests and experiences. Maybe your next stated meeting could be thirty minutes of ritual and business, and two hours for the mini-golf tournament.

It is said that the meaning or purpose of Masonry is to make good men better. Certainly, the ritual gives a man some insight or tools on how to approach that idea. But I dare say that the real way that Masonry does that is by providing opportunity for good men to spend time with other good men. Iron sharpens iron.

So, to summarize – learn from our history. Redouble your efforts to build our membership by being visible.

Inspire our members with a dynamic initiation experience built upon ritual excellence. Give meaning to Masonry by ensuring that we are both serious about the work we do and the fun we have along the way so that we want to keep spending time with one another. I'm convinced that if we do these things, Freemasonry will not only survive in Idaho but will grow to greater heights than what we have seen before.

Report of the Jurisprudence Committee (Resolutions)

401-1 Jurisprudence Report

John Warner, PGM

Brother, this is a time when we have to start making some of the most important decisions. The decisions we make now are setting the future of our grand jurisdiction. Jurisprudence has reviewed these resolutions in accordance with the Code. Our job is to see if they were in conflict. We worked extremely hard starting back in February. We found 2 words in the dictionary to help us that we don't see a lot, Common Sense. Quote that we tried to work by. I'm not going to go through everything. I'm going to briefly cover what the resolution is about. I'm going to go to give the rationale. And then, if anybody else has other questions about it, we'll be doing taking 3 for and 3 against. Is that the concept? So, let's see what we got.

Resolutions

M:.W:. John Warner, PGM / Jurisprudence Chairman

The first thing we received was a Constitutional Amendment, which does not have to come to Jurisprudence, but it ended up on our desk. Basically, we just took that and forwarded it to the Grand Master with the understanding that the code says he would read it at the Grand Lodge and then distribute it to the subordinate Lodges for their vote.

Resolution 2. Reads by-Law as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

By-Laws, Part Three Article I GENERAL PROVISIONS – Section 103, Annual Communications:

5. Entire paragraph as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

Section 103. Annual Communication. An Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge shall be held each year, commencing at 9:00 a.m. on the Third Thursday in September (revised Sept 1989)

The location of the Annual Communication shall follow a 3-year geographically based rotation schedule. The true geographical areas are defined as follows: Eastern Idaho shall include all districts east of a North-South line though Jerome, including the Jerome metropolitan area and south of the time-change line between the Mountain Time Zone and the Pacific Time Zone. Southwestern Idaho shall include all districts west of a North-South line thru Jerome excluding the Jerome metropolitan area and south of the time-change line between the mountain Time Zone and the Pacific Time Zone. Northern Idaho shall include all districts north of the time-change line between the Mountain Time Zone and the Pacific Time Zone.

The rotation shall be as follows: if the most recent Annual Communication was held in the area of eastern Idaho. The subsequent Annual Communication shall be held in the area of Northern Idaho, if the most recent Annual Communication was held in the area of Norther Idaho. The subsequent Annual Communication shall be held in the area of Eastern Idaho; and the same consecutive area rotation shall be maintained thereafter. (Revised Sept. 2024)

REGULATONS 10, Concordant and Appendant Orders, Clubs and Associations. Recognition and Regulations:

Concordant and Appendant Orders. Clubs and Associations. Recognition and Regulations.

1. Concordant Orders, orders that require all members to be Master Masons in good standing are recognized as Concordant Masonic Organizations to which Masons, who are in good standing in a recognized Ancient Craft Lodge, may belong. Recognition of Concordant Orders shall be granted only after approval by the Grand Lodge.

Appendant Orders, organizations with which recognized Concordant Orders are in fraternal correspondence, and which are Masonic in character, may be recognized if such recognition would not be averse to the best interests of Freemasonry in this Jurisdiction. Recognition of Appendant Orders shall be granted only after approval by the Grand Lodge. No Mason within this Jurisdiction may join, attend, or remain present at, any unrecognized Order, nor may he become involved in Masonic intercourse with any member thereof. Concordant and Appendant Orders. Clubs and Associations. Recognition and Regulations.

- 1. Concordant Orders, orders that require all members to be Master Masons in good standing are recognized as Concordant Masonic Organizations to which Masons, who are in good standing in a recognized Ancient Craft Lodge, may belong. Recognition of Concordant Orders shall be granted only after approval by the Grand Lodge.
- 2. Appendant Orders, organizations with which recognized Concordant Orders are in fraternal correspondence, and which are Masonic in character, may be recognized if such recognition would not be averse to the best interests of Freemasonry in this Jurisdiction. Recognition of Appendant Orders shall be granted only after approval by the Grand Lodge. No Mason within this Jurisdiction

- may join, attend, or remain present at, any unrecognized Order, nor may he become involved in Masonic intercourse with any member thereof.
- 3. Masonic Clubs and Associations are organizations formed by Masons for the pursuit of a common interest. Such organizations do not confer degrees or orders. Masonic Clubs and Associations ar neither Concordant nor Appendant Orders. Such organizations may operate within this jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Idaho A.F. & A.M. without requesting formal recognition from the Grand Lodge, and Masons within this Jurisdiction may join, attend, or remain present. The grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. will take responsibility or liability for the actions of any Masonic Club or Association.

All Concordant and Appendant Orders and Masonic Clubs or Associations which require any Masonic membership prerequisite shall also require each of its members to remain in good standing in a recognized Ancient Craft Lodge shall be immediately terminated in all other Concordant or Appendant Orders and Masonic Clubs or Associations. A list of approved Concordant and Appendant Orders is maintained in the Office of the Grand Secretary. (Revised Sept. 2024)

"For the purpose of discussion, I move that this resolution be adopted."

One of the issues I have with this proposal, I will try to clarify this, but the former policy of appendant orders was that if a concordant body like the York Right or Scottish Rite recognized that, the Grand Lodge didn't need to formally recognize it, so it's not listed anywhere. This informal policy was given by jurisprudence over several different years and approved by this Grand Lodge. If this resolution passes which attendant orders are approved? If none are until another resolution is brought to Grand Lodge that impacts the membership of all the authors of this resolution, several Grand Lodge officers, and Past Grand Masters. It impacts groups like Niles, Star, and Amaranth, do we only recognize I recognize those currently in Idaho because that will impact several brothers who are in appendant orders outside of Idaho? Where is the list created? "Any brother, speaking in favor, any brother speaking in favor. We'll go to the second opposition. MW Grand Master, Sherman Burger, PGM, Mt Moriah No. 39, I don't think it's a good idea to take the list of the organizations out of our Code. This gives everybody a place to find out which organizations are approved and which organizations need to be approved before they can become a member of them. Having a list in the Grand Secretary's office is, I think, not nearly as good of an idea as having a list posted in our rules and regulations. It's too easy for those lists to become lost. Just look at all the work that we have gone through in the past, just trying to figure out which Grand Lodges we have recognized and which Grand Lodges we have not. It's going to be the same thing with these Appendant and Concordant orders if we move the list out of the regulation. Thank you. Last call for speaker for, MWGM, Brethren all, MWPGM Joe Alexander, these are good points that are brought up, but the Code & Digest is for giving people the idea or the process by which you could become recognized in this case. And yes, it's a convenient place to go to in the code. Although we have a software program called Grandview. I'm sure that there's somebody in the Grand Secretary's office who can figure out how to post that list of organizations on Grandview. It does not need to be in the code, but that causes is every time we recognize or we unrecognize somebody, we have to change the code to digest by resolution. And that doesn't make any sense. So, what the committee did in drafting this proposal was to try and put the procedure in there for becoming recognized by all these different associations. Just to clarify for Brother Barry a little bit, he mentioned the Daughters of the Nile. That's a recognized group of the

Shrine, which we recognize. We do not independently recognize Daughters of Nile, if you read in there or read in today's Code & Digest, we recognize the Shrine in Idaho and all of its bodies which Daughters of the Nile are part of. There is another piece of that, in research we have never recognized the Beauceant because it's part of the York Rite that we recognize. That's why they aren't on the list and don't need to be on the list. You, can vote your will, but I would ask you to vote in favor of this t help clean the code up a little bit and we can certainly post that list on Grandview. Point of order Richard Broemeling PGM Elmore 30, In the 3rd paragraph here I believe you stated that these funds and organizations would not be responsible and Grand Lodge would not be responsible to them. (John Warner) Most Worshipful what I said was that the Grand Lodge is not responsible for any liability for those particular clubs. In the last sentence of paragraph 3, of the resolutions that I received at registration. It states the Grand Lodge will take responsibility or liability for the actions of any Masonic club and association. I move that the resolution be tabled and voted on next year. You are correct, the synopsis does not contain the word "not" which is a misprint, if you look at the Regulations in the same resolution package, you will see that the word "not" is present, and we are voting on what is written in the Resolution as submitted not the synopsis. The actual language of the resolution will be what we will be voting upon, which has the language that Brother Warner read. We have a motion on the floor let us address that first. Those in favor of tabling this Resolution until next year vote with your voting cards; those opposed, motion failed. MWGM, Greg Winther, PGM, something that I find interesting is that it states, rightly so, that the Grand Lodge should not be liable and I assume that they mean financially. Gentlemen, I am more concerned about our liability in the court of public opinion. That's the group that judges us, not a court but public opinion in our current climate where we are struggling to entice and encourage membership to have any negative press, we could say we are not liable in the press. I would hate to take on any groups that could form at will where we take public liability. "Thank you, we will have one more pro discussion chance. MWGM and Brothers, Robert Middlebrook, Master of Butte 37, With the last statement that was made, I am going to say that I am a Chapter President for a local Widow Sons group. We all have to be Masons to be part of that group and I hate to say that, that statement is wrong that was just made. You all have taken on the responsibility of having been raised to a Master Mason. We are responsible for our own actions in public.

 - 1. On December 15, 2014, a request for recognition from the M. W. Grand Lodge of Albania was received. The Grand Lodge of Albania consecrated on October 14, 2011 in Tirana by the Grand Orient of Italy. It is composed of three lodges previously warranted by the Grand Orient of Italy. It has adopted the Ritual and Book of Constitution of the Grand Orient, the Principles for Grand Lodges Recognition accepted by the United Grand Lodge of England, as well as the "Aims and Relationships of the Craft" of the UGLE. The CIR is of the opinion that the Grand Lodge of Albania meets the standards for recognition.
 - 2. Based on this information your committee recommends that their request for recognition be granted.

We move to adopt recognition of the Grand Lodge of Albania, motion was seconded and carried.

- 3. On February 1, 2015, a request for recognition from the M. W. Gran Logia Simbólica del Paraguay was received. Over the last six years, the CIR has continued to study the split in the Grand Lodge of Paraguay that resulted in the two Grand Lodges. Based on their investigation, they have been led to the conclusion that the Grand Lodge Symbolic whose Grand Master is M/W Bro Euclides, is the only Grand Lodge in Paraguay that meets the standards for recognition.
- 4. Based on this information your committee recommends that their request for recognition be granted.

We move to adopt recognition of the M.W. Grand Logia Simbólica del Paraguay, motion was seconded and carried.

- B. At the 152nd Annual Communication held on September 19th, 20th, and 21st, 2019, the Fraternal Relations Committee reported the following:
 - 1. The Grand Orient of Minas Gerais and The Grand Oriente De Mato Grosso Do Sul have both sent letters requesting recognition. The 2019 Report of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America States: "Brazil State Grand Orients, The Grande Orient de Minas Gerais and the Grand Oriente de Mato Grosso do Sul were each recognized by and treaties signed with their respective State Grand Lodges in 2018. Each of these bodies are also recognized by the CMI. It would be reasonable to assume that these grand orients are practicing regular Masonry and recognition would be appropriate if you so desire." This Committee recommends that the Grand Lodge of Idaho recognize The Grand Orient de Minas Gerais and The Grand Oriente De Mato Grosso Do Sul.

We move to adopt recognition of the Grand Orient de Minas Gerais and The Grand Oriente De Mato Grosso Do Sul, motion was seconded and carried.

- C. During this Masonic Year, we received the following requests for recognition.
 - 1. On March 14, 2024, a letter from the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Georgia headquartered in Tbilisi requesting recognition of their Grand Lodge by the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM. This letter was accompanied by the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Georgia, dated in 2015 as amended; the list of Grand Officers of the Grand Lodge of Georgia; and the 2023 and 2024 reports of the Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand of Grand Masters of North America. The Commission reported in those two years that the Grand Lodge of Georgia meets the requirements for recognition. Therefore, we recommend that the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM grant recognition to the Grand Lodge of Georgia AF&AM.

This request was approved at the $156^{\rm th}$ Annual Communication. No further action is required.

2. On June 3, 2024, a letter from the Grand Secretary for Foreign Affairs of the Grande Oriente do Rio Grande do Norte in Triol, Natal-RN, requesting recognition of their Grand Orient by the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM. The letter was accompanied by a list of the officers of the Grand Orient, a translation of the Constitution of the Grand Orient which lists the principles of the institution, and a translation of the treaty between the Grand Orient of Brazil and the Grand Orient of Rio Grand de Norte allowing to operate within the state. The Commission on Information for Recognition has not reviewed this Grand Orient for compliance. We recommend that this request be held over until next year when the Commission will give a decision.

D. During this year several communications were received from Grand Lodges that we are in amity with. We received lists of new officers for Grand Lodges, a notice of Expelled/Suspended members of the Grand Lodge of Ukraine making unauthorized communications, an announcement from the United Grand Lodges of Germany suspending communications with the Grand Lodge of Russia, and a decree from the Grand Orient of Italy suspending relations with the Scottish Rite in Italy.

"The motion to receive the Fraternal Relations Committee has been seconded, is there any discussion. All in favor vote by raise hands, all opposed same sign, Motion Passes" "Brother Chad Smith, the Executive officer of DeMolay, I would like for you to give a presentation, I know your report is in the proceedings but we have something we need to discuss."

MWGM and Brethren of the Grand Lodge, I appreciate your time today. Typically, at this time, I would give you a little bit of how Idaho DeMolay is doing, but as the Grand Master alluded to, we have a little different topic that I'd like to discuss with you today and get your opinion on since we're all gathered here. So, over the last year, Idaho DeMolay has pretty much remained constant with the majorities we had, we were able to replace these members and kind of keep our membership about the same size. We didn't have positive growth, but we also didn't really have negative growth in away. That's kind of the theme of the day and I want to thank Brother Jeremy for his oration earlier. But, one of the things that keeps going through my head over the last few months is that complacency is not an option to maintain Idaho DeMolay, we need to do something and we need to do it now. I'd like to propose a pretty out-of-the-box thought about how I think that we can best do that with the help of a neighboring jurisdiction. What I'm here to propose to this Grand Lodge is that Idaho and Oregon continue some conversations about becoming a partnership and merging into one jurisdiction. So that we can help each other grow at the same time instead of fighting the same battles in two different cities. With that right now DeMolay in Oregon and Idaho are relatively the same size when it comes to active membership. I think Oregon has maybe 15 more members active and when I say active it means showing up more consistently than we do. But at this time how do we essentially take two jurisdictions that are running around 30 to 35 members showing up consistently and making that closer to 70 members while we tried to make that grow to 100 in each jurisdiction. So, it's one of those of how do we share our resources? How do we share our talents? You know, I got it handed to you rather, Brother Steve, earlier today when you admitted that you have certain strengths and certain weaknesses. I'm the same exact way. I'm very good at seeing an idea and running that to the ground, but I'm not the greatest, but thinking of new ideas and how we get out of this, the current situation thar we are in. My counterpart over in Oregon happens to be very good at that. He was an incredible brainstormer. He has built a several businesses. Um, that basically revolve around thinking outside the box. and I think with our two skill sets, we can make one really strong jurisdiction to help both of us grow for a temporary gain until we can both get back on our own feet and run as a jurisdiction as we all remember that we have always been. Really the justification of this is with the young men in both jurisdictions, they deserve

the best program that we can give them and every once in a while. I gotta check my Ego at the door here and say I' not the right guy at the time for that. I think John could really help us with that with some assistance from the Idaho staff. But we all need pledge to help them. Most Worshipful, I'm not sure really the next path on this and I'm not here to field any questions on how this might really work, but it really doesn't change the day-today chapter operations within Idaho or Oregon as much as there'll be a new Executive Officer and at the same time the programs that he's already got the ball rolling on that we can roll into Idaho to help us grow a little bit faster. So, it's really question of are we as a Grand Lodge is willing to try and give this a chance to try to help DeMolay grow in the greater northwest? Or, is there a different route that we want to go within our, DeMolay? I guess it's a two-part question of are we as a Grand Lodge still going to support the DeMolay Masonic youth organization regardless of what we're called and over the next few months would this body being committed to allowing John Bolton to start seeing how this process really looks and how this transition will look with some oversight obviously from the Grand Lodge Officers, that we would report to on a regular basis on how it is going. I know it's a little two-part question. I'm here to answer any and all questions for clarity on this issue. But it's just one of those, we've been just like Brother Jeremy was saying, how long have we been arguing about the things we have reading about for the last 150 years. You know it has been the same way DeMolay since 1919. So maybe it's time we think out-of-the-box, get ourselves back to where we need to be and then we'll re-evaluate what that looks like there. Most Worshipful, I know it is not an easy conversation.

I open the floor for questions to either the Executive Officer or the Grand Lodge, just so you know the elected Grand Lodge officers met with a delegation from Oregon to discuss whether this might be feasible and what it might look like. It's still too early in the planning phases. I didn't want to dump this on the Deputy Grand Maste, but sorry Rick. The final decisions are gonna occur during your term. I'll first open the floor to the discussions. Mostly you should direct them to Chad, but if you have a question for me. I'll try to address those. The floor is open, please go to the mics. There's no pro con here, it's open discussion. And I'll call the first one that gets the first mic that appears to be brother John Boyer.

I am John Boyer, PM Hagerman 78 and DDGM of district 4, I do have a question and I don't have a positive or negative opinion about the issue being new, but I I wonder. I guess this is the protocol this for a body which supports DeMolay, but it's the it's the ultimately the leadership of DeMolay in Kansas City that will approve or disapprove of something like this. I surmised that you're just asking whether this body will still support the DeMolay if you do that option. Is that correct? That is correct. John does bring up a good point, about our corporate office in Kansas City, we have run this past the elected line for the Supreme Council of DeMolay Internationally, they will support it if the two Grand Lodges support it. So, it's really up to the Grand Lodges and they will support that whatever decision they make. Greg Winther PGM, my question is for you, Chad and for the Most Worshipful Master. I grew up in DeMolay and I'm very committed to the success of DeMolay, and it sounds like this is thought out and joining programs could have advantages. But I remember as being a DeMolay, one of the struggles I had was traveling with the DeMolay because I didn't have any money. By enlarging this jurisdiction to that size, how are you going to move boys from meetings to conclaves, etcetera, The discussions we've had about conclaves is to have them somewhere central like a Pendleton or something like that, so Northern Idaho can make it as easy as Southern Idaho. I mean, obviously knowing our geography Idaho Falls and Pocatello are probably the short end of that stick, but it is one of those we have talked about. It would really be one annual convention just like Grand Lodge that would require the most travel and then a lot of smaller regional events that would be less traveled or most of the kids and less strain on the advisors. So the follow-up question is if the boys aren't able to afford it, like the situation I was in with the Grand Lodges be asked to support those travel bills. That's a very, I mean, we do tend to lean on lodges to help out, but that's all that donation based and part of our fundraising efforts as well. So, one of those we're going to have to take responsibility for the decision too and try to do what's best for the kids. GM "I'll try to help clarify a little bit. there's still negotiations going on if this would move forward, of how many years the combined jurisdiction because they wouldn't be Oregon DeMolay wouldn't be Idaho DeMolay but some of us another jurisdictional name. I requested that the committee that the DeMolay organizations think about committing to five years of

East of the Cascades because of the expensive cost for us to travel from Eastern Idaho to Portland or somewhere on the West Coast. There's a lot of negotiations going on. I know one of the problems with DeMolay in Idaho, is advisors. That's us, gentlemen, we should be the primary advisors for all our youth, especially DeMolay. How many men are advisors or were advisors in Idaho DeMolay, raise your hand. It should be a lot larger, gentlemen, how many of you were DeMolay, almost as much. Not short changing the ladies, we also need to support them, but one of Chad's biggest struggles over the last five years has been advisors. You can't have a Chapter without advisors. We need to do a better job and if this combined jurisdiction comes to fruition. Then we are going to need advisors to launch the rebirth program and to follow the contingency plan that once both jurisdictions are strong enough, that we will split the jurisdiction back into two jurisdictions. I grew up in DeMolay in Missouri, my district conclaves were the size of Idaho's largest conclave and we had book the whole hotel in Jefferson City, MO for our conclave. I'd like to see Masonry get that large and I would like to see DeMolay get that large again Idaho. Are there any other questions for Chad or for myself? I don't want to steal your words, Chad, but he's asking the permission from the Grand Lodge to continue looking along with our sister jurisdiction in Oregon on merging the two DeMolay jurisdictions under one with a formal plan that's been approved by DI. Which has a way to split the jurisdictions back up when they're determined to be large enough. Is that close enough? So' would you move for that? You just say so moved. So moved.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"It has been moved and seconded that the Grand Lodge of Idaho approved continuing negotiations with. DeMolay Oregon and DeMolay Idaho with approval of the Grand Lodges. I don't want to speak for the Oregon Grand Lodge, but we did meet and agree to investigate the combining of the two jurisdictions; is that is correct MWB Tim? YES "So with that all those in favor of that vote by the usual sign of a Mason when voting those opposed same sign, the motion passes. Brother Chad you have your marching orders to work with the Executive Officer of Oregon. The Grand Lodge of Idaho will support, continue to support DeMolay whether Idaho, or it's new jurisdiction. Thank you, thank you" "Is my grand historian in the room? Rick, would you come to the mic and tell everyone the bus I threw you under? It's an unusual Grand Historian report. Everywhere I traveled and met Rick, he fired off Masonic trivia questions to me and some were about Freemasonry in general, but most were on Idaho Masonic history. He's a proficient reader and student of the Grand Lodge proceedings of Idaho. With all his research efforts, he made a Masonic trivia report. So why don't you just give us a couple of those good Masonic zingers?"

Report of the Idaho Masonic Foundation

Section 605 Grand Lodge Charitable Trust

Greg Winther, PGM

I have to take my glasses off to read. To the Most Worshipful Grand Master Gary and the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge AF and AM of Idaho. Hello brothers, The Idaho Freemason Foundation is excited and thankful for this past year. It has been a time that you, the Masons of Idaho, have been there to support the volunteers on the board and your charitable foundation for children. Thank you for the hours that you have put in with your own lodge to make this unique foundation work. Financially, here is how the foundation stands. In the Idaho Central Credit Union, we have \$3000. Our backup fund is kept in Wells Fargo Investors to keep the foundation alive for generations to come. It totals \$82,000. We pay grants to lodges from the donated funds that we receive from the annual appeal. We are good stewards of your money. And every board member is an unpaid volunteer. The Board of Directors are excited because the number of Lodges that participate increases every year. This year, what do you think, 15 or 20 Lodges? There were actually 23 lodges that participated this year and requested funding for their own choice of causes to help kids in their communities. This meant that Idaho lodges, with the help of the foundation, spent more than \$23,000 for the benefit of kids in Idaho communities. Some of the ideas this year were fantastic. Butte Lodge in Emmett built a kids splash pad recreation area; Capital City Lodge in Boise supported teachers' classroom projects, Challis Lodge upgraded an ice rink at the elementary school, Elmore Lodge in Mountain Home helped fund Story Stroll in the park for the Children's Library, Initial Point Lodge in Kuna filled the elementary school pantry, Ionic Lodge in Cascade ran a Kindle for books program, while Weiser Lodge ran the bikes for Books program, Lakeside Lodge in Sandpoint paid off school lunch debt so that those kids could eat lunch again, that's a big deal, Lincoln Lodge in Gooding supported a camp for the blind and hearing impaired children. Meridian Lodge supported a camp for kids with type 1 diabetes, here's my favorite, St. Mary's Lodge paid for court appointed special advocates for children, and there are still another 11 Lodges I could tell you about. I am here to say Idaho Masons have had a huge impact for the benefit of children this year. And thank you all, my Brothers. Fraternally, Greg Winther, Chairman; Mark Smith, Secretary; Russ Graves, Treasurer; Thomas Everson, Director; Michael Sutton, Director; Kenneth Beaudreau, Director; Derek Sprague, Director; John Ransdell and Dan Levine, Directors. At this time, would the board members present please rise? I'll get my glasses back on. We've got two that are in the room right now and I think Russ Grave is the Tyler outside the door. I'd like to introduce in the white shirt Mark Smith, he's a past District Deputy Grand Master, from Meridian Lodge. He's been our secretary now for many years and is the hardest working member of the board. If any of you have a chance and think about it, thank Mark. He's the one that is working the hardest. And next to Mark is Dan Levine, Dan represents us in the Coeur d'Alene Rathdrum area. We're trying to have directors from all around the state. Mark and Dan, thanks for standing up and thanks for your work this year.

"I didn't think this report was worth it, but I move that the Board's report be received, not distributed, but just received and laid upon the proceedings."

"It has been moved and seconded that the report of the Grand Lodge Charitable Trust be received. All those in favor vote sign with Mason when voting, those opposed. I want to thank the brothers first because it's your donations. But I know that the committee watches over the money and a lot of the Lodges are very happy to receive the matching funds to support their local children's charities. For those of you that don't know what the Idaho Foundation is, it's our only 501C3 charitable organization in Idaho. None of our other funds are a 501 c3, not even our Relief Fund nor is Endowment Fund a 501 c3. So, this is what. Brothers that have a little extra money, that might need a tax break, can donate to and get that tax break. I appreciate all the work you guys do in the Lodges, keep asking them for money to match your donation to support the children in need. Thank you."

(Greg) It would be great to have more than 23 Lodges participate this next year, let's grow some more, get out into your communities. As it was mentioned in our Grand Orator's report, involvement in the community is so important. Besides the fact that we are helping kids, the biggest advantage of your foundation is it gets your lodge in the community. It gets the community recognizing that you care and the community recognizing that you're there. So please get involved and thank you.

"We will return to the suspended business of voting on our Resolutions. MW Brother John, you will start where we left off on Resolution 3"

Resolutions

M.: W.: John Warner, PGM / Jurisprudence Chairman

OK, going back to Resolution 3, this is the resolution we were discussing before refreshment. It is the resolution about the Concordant and Appendant bodies. We have already had 3 for and against, MWGM do you want to reopen for discussion?

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"No, we already had the discussion, so I now call for the question, all those in favor of Resolution 3 stand and vote with your voting cards. Tellers get your tally, they'll ask you to sit down. Those voting against." (Teller) MWGM results for resolution #3, votes for, tally at 60 votes, votes against tally at 87. "Thank you. Resolution 3 **FAILS**."

Resolution 4. Reads by-Law as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

By-Laws, Part one Article III POWERS AND DUTIES OF GRAND OFFICERS – Section 303, Deputy Grand Master:

The Deputy Grand Master shall:

1. Discharge such executive functions of the Grand Lodge as may be delegated to him by the Grand Master

2. Prepare the Grand Lodge Budget for the ensuing year. As soon as is practicable, he shall present a draft budget to the Grand Lodge Officers and receive their comments and suggestions. After resolving comments, the preliminary budget should be presented to the constituent lodges at the direction of the Grand Master. (Revised Sept 2024)

"For the purpose of discussion, I move that Resolution 4 be adopted."

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"It has been moved and seconded that Resolution 4 be adopted. We will now have the discussion, please use the procedures as before."

Eric Coryell MWGM, this resolution does little more than identify a single point of contact to develop the budget, which we don't have that currently. We believe that one person should be specified in the Code & Digest as responsible for the budget. The obvious person to do that is the Deputy Grandmaster/Grandmaster elect, because he will be developing it for his year as Grand Master. He can call on any other he can call on any other support he may need, just as we've done in the past. Such as the Grand secretary, Grand Treasurer, Investments, all of that. But in the end, it would be his responsibility to see it developed and disseminated.

"Thank you, brother. Opposed to the resolution."

Most Worshipful Grandmaster Skip Owen PGM. I oppose this for several reasons. We ran this thing for 145 years and basically the Accounts & Finances, developing the budget. In all of those years, we generally had two guys that were familiar with the process. They knew the income streams and they knew the expenses. I'm going to give you a little example, I remember a Past Grand Master, who in his year wanted to go to Japan. He had one buddy for and one buddy against. But the old sage guys on the committee said, you know, we can't help support him to go to Japan just because we would have set a precedent. I don't know how this works with the Deputy Grand Masters basically saying, well, maybe this is what I want to do this year. I think we as a fraternity, it's a little like the fox in the hen house. But more importantly, what we seem to lose sight of in this picture. Because everything is pretty much the same. It's expensive. Same every year except for your income stream. The income stream goes down every year if our membership goes down. And that's been dramatic over the last 20 years. So, I would submit this to you, Grand Lodge officers coming in, do you want to sit here and have the responsibility of submitting a budget that you may have to cut the Grand Secretary's position, all your travel expenses? I mean, the flip side of that, if you don't want to cut it, do you want to submit that you're going to have to increase per capita? That's a foolish idea. This should be handled by Accounts & Finances. There probably should be some Past Grand Masters on that Committee that have continuity through the years of how the process works. This isn't rocket science budget, if you look through the past years, it's pretty much the same. Our main contention is this income stream and how we do that. Heard in the rumors that some think that maybe we ought to have per capita \$200. Whatever, you know, we all have different thoughts. But I think that the closer you get this to the Grand Lodge guys, I think your job should be for the Craft. Am I going to long.?

"Time. Will entertain discussion in favor of the resolution and if there's an opposed, please make your way to the mic."

MWGM, Randy King, Silver City lodge #13 Senior Grand Warden. I'm in favor of this resolution and one of the signers on it. It affects me directly. As the Deputy Grand Master/Grand Master elect, I think it's my responsibility to Craft. To be a good steward of the funds, we have a fiduciary responsibility to you. You're the ones that get to approve the budget. All I'm suggesting is I prepare the budget based upon what I feel my plans are for the year. But I must present it to you, the Craft, and you have to approve it. I am a Past Grand Treasurer, and I understand the budgeting process. I think also it encourages the Grand Lodge officers to work together to develop that budget, to share that knowledge with each other. As Brother Eric said, we have the opportunity to call on anybody, we call on Accounts & Finance, we call on the Grand Treasurer, we call on the Investment

Committee to help us put together the numbers, it's not a crapshoot. There's a process that we go through. Thank you.

Sherman Burger PGM, this is an idea that comes up every so many years in Grand Lodge, and I remember the last time it came up I came to Grand Lodge all set to vote for it. I thought it was a great idea and Brother Skip got up and talked against it and changed my mind. So, Skip, you do have some influence on me every once in a while. What Skip said then, that he didn't say today, was that what this sets up is for conflict and discontent between the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary if the Deputy Grand Master proposes a budget, that cuts items for the Grand Secretary's office because it needs to be done. It may need to be done, but if the Grandmaster is doing it, the Grand Secretary is going to have animosity towards him for the entire year, and the office will not function well. If a committee that is not made up of Grand Lodge officers sets the budget, you don't have that potential for animosity. And Brother Skip, you were right then, and I believe you're right today.

"The third and last in favor of the resolution?"

MWGM, Monte Bollar, Master of Initial 98 and Grand Secretary Emeritus, Brothers the idea of this legislation is not to take the power of anybody away. It puts an individual that is looking out for you when putting a budget together. It always seems, when getting a budget put together, that it has caused problems. In the past, and I think in the future, it still needs the Grand Secretary to put last year's budget for the Deputy Grand Master. The Deputy Grand Master looks out of what can I add, what can I take away? He puts it in front of the Grand Lodge officers at the planning meeting. They decide what they need and discuss it. They talk with the accounts and finances and see if the proposal is manageable and where do we get the money. There's also an investment committee that can we put this money together. I'm not taking power away from anybody. I don't think this resolution takes power away from anybody. What he does is put one person responsible in the Code & Digest, because right now the Code & Digest has no one that is responsible for the budget. If you can find a place in the Code & Digest where it says somebody is responsible for the budget, come and show me. I'm trying to say the Deputy Grand Master is coming up with his budget and I know every chairman of Accounts & Finances that has come through, hates it. He has to give his report and everybody hates him if they have to raise the per capita. Thank you.

"Thank you. One last in opposition."

MWGM, Brand Cannon PGM, I have been coming to this Grand Lodge for an awful lot of years now. I've seen it, the Accounts & Finances working in some great ways to try to keep per-capita down. Grand Masters and Deputy Grand masters have never been left out of the budget process. They're generally called in during the Grand Lodge and Accounts & Finances are usually here a day early. They talked about their plans and talked about what they need for money to work that into the budget. Those individuals have generally had some financial background, are familiar with budgets, and tried very hard, I think. Steven has been one of those, my dad to be one of those that tried to keep the per-capita down for you Brothers. They did it in a way that was constructive. They received a budget, preliminary budget from the Grand Secretary. They tear it apart and put it back together again. They have people in, they talk, they discuss, they bring it to the floor of the Grand Lodge for discussion, and it was voted. To me it looks like you're eliminating Accounts & Finances. What are they going to do? Just report, and ask all in favor to say aye? What are the Accounts & Finances functions if the Deputy Grand Master, Grandmaster, and the Grand Lodge officers set the budget at a meeting in Pocatello, or wherever it is at? Who breaks that down? Who says no, no, you can't do that. That's why you have an independent Accountant & Finances to go through that. You guys have never been left out. You've always been brought before the Accounts & Finance Committee. You've always talked about how much money you needed, and it's always worked in the past. Before you put one guy in charge of the budget. We've got all the rest of these brothers here. This has to be done by Accounts & Finance. It's always been done by Accounts & Finance, don't eliminate the Accounts & Finance. It's a very important part of this Grand Lodge.

"We've heard three in favor and three opposed to the resolution. It's now time to vote. Those in favor of the adoption of resolution #4 please stand with your ballots, all apposed. Resolution 4, **FAILS**, Thank you, Brethren. I now call for Resolution 5."

Resolution 5. Reads regulation as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

Regulations; ARTICLE 39, Monitor

The Worshipful Master shall never use an Idaho Monitor during the performance of the adopted Idaho Work or permit anyone else to do so except when it is used for prayers, charges, the perambulation, funerals, installations, educational programs, or by anyone sitting on the side-lines, while the lodge is at labor. Additionally, the Grand Master may by dispensation, for each request, allow the reading of a single lecture from the Idaho Monitor for a degree, so long as there is a demonstrated need, and the manner of the presentation does not violate Regulation 15. The reading of the work shall not be acceptable for proficiency, An Idaho Monitor shall not be used, except as provided for in these regulations, to prompt the performance of the adopted Idaho Work. (revised Sept. 2024)

"To put the resolution on the floor, I move that Resolution 5 be adopted."

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"It has been moved and seconded to adopt resolution #5, which would authorize the reading of the lecture under certain circumstances. We will now have the discussion, please use the procedures as before. First in favor of the resolution"

Wayne Heath, Junior Warden Paradise 17 and I'm also the author of this resolution. This resolution addresses some concerns that a number of lodges have that have come before Grand Lodge before. I'm struggling to find people being able to perform the actions. I believe that this is a good solution because it does not fundamentally change the character of the presentation. That means that they're presented by a person in the room who is familiar with the work. Reading the lecture requires a good understanding of the lecture when addressing the candidate. This resolution does not allow someone to just pick up their Code and present the lecture. The presenter will still need to be prepared for the degree, but this will shorten the amount of time it takes for them to be ready. The presenter may benefit after a time or two of reading the lecture with more confidence and be able to present the work from memory in the future. This is the way the lecture should be presented, from memory. The requirement for a dispensation, I believe, is the most important part of this resolution. It guards against the reading of the work becoming the norm within our Lodges. I believe this resolution balances helping struggling lodges with work and protecting the tradition of excellence in Idaho masonry. Thank you.

"Well, here are the first in opposition of the resolution."

MWGM, Barry Newell, Oriental 60. I stood here nine years ago when the Board of Custodians made their recommendation to allow monitors to be opened in Lodge on the sideline. Brother Jeremy and I argued back and forth about it. It was coming down to the fact, that it was okay because the ritual work would not be done with the monitor. And now here we are nine years later, talking about having to monitor open for the lectures. We as Masons, we need to be willing to work together outside the lodge, not just one day a month, but maybe 5-6. We need to be working with each other, as Jeremy said, to make our ritual meaningful, not something that is being read from the book, if somebody is reading something to me, I could take it home and read it myself. I don't need somebody to read it to me. We also have resources here within the State of Idaho to help us out in

our Lodges. We have the York right college, our Secretary Brother Jeremy, if you reach out to him if your Lodge needs lecture help, and he will help find someone. There are proficient brothers statewide that can help out with this. We do not need to lower our standards further and further. Eventually we're going to get to the point that we might as well just be the Rotary Club.

"Entertain. Presentation in favor of the resolution. Do we have someone in favor of the resolution proceeding on the mic?"

MWGM, ?? Ionic 82, I am not particularly in favor of this, but I do bring one point on this resolution is the fact that it states that permission to use the monitor during the lecture would be by dispensation. I can't imagine that if someone reached out to you for a dispensation, that you or any Grand Master would not find someone that would volunteer and not have to use that dispensation. This might just be a great way to communicate that a Lodge needs help. Thank you.

"Next discussion on opposition."

MWGM, Distinguished guests, and Brothers all, Brian Becker Coeur D' Alene 20. Seven-time Past Master I'm in one of these small lodges and I've been Masters of other small lodges where it's difficult to make quorum. Having a brother with the monitor so he can give a word or something like that during the degree has never been an issue. Even our Brethren to the north in Canada have a Director of Ceremonies that does the same thing. He follows along and when somebody needs a word, he gives them the word. But we mostly complain about fast food masonry, and yet we seem to keep wanting to go that direction. So those are the reasons I'm against it. Thank you.

"One last in favor of the resolution. One last in favor of the resolution."

Steve Crane, Past Master Lakeside 42. I think sometimes we get confused about what is the purpose of the lecture. The purpose of the lecture is not to prove that somebody could memorize something. The purpose of the lecture is to provide education. If we can provide better education for a candidate because we're reading it correctly and doing a better job correctly. Where we get hurt is when we have someone who gives a lecture, mumbles through it, you can't hear him, and the candidate is sleeping over here because it's so terrible. Let's remember what the purpose of the lecture is.

"The third speaker in opposition to the resolution."

MWGM, Howie Bloom Past Master Ashlar 29. I've heard the first two brothers who were in favor of this. They mentioned a particular point that is requesting the dispensation and they said they could hardly imagine you or a future Grand Master not finding an educated enough brother to do the lecture. We already have that mechanism in Grandview. You enter the parts that you can do, within how many miles, and how many days' notice you need. We already have that so that makes those arguments mute points. Brother Crane's oratory about what the lecture is all about and what its purpose is. It has several purposes, but the other purpose for memorizing the lectures is that this brother here has memorized or given well a 28-minute or 32-minute lecture, and he's also traveled 50 miles to give the candidate this lecture. This is how much he appreciates you and this is what a Brother will step forward and do during your time in masonry. Our commitment to them, which instills their commitment to us and the craft. I don't know who would get that by reading a lecture, however well. I don't think that would give the same response. Thank you, Brothers.

"You've heard three in favor and three opposed. We will now vote on resolution #5. All those in favor, stand with your voting cards. I believe I can call this one. Resolution **Fails.**" "We will now hear Resolution 6"

Resolution 6. Reads by-Law as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

By-Laws, Part One, ARTICLE VIII, WORK AND LECTUIRES, Section 804 - Streaming Lectures

Section 804. Streaming Lectures. The 1st, Middle Chamber and 3rd degree lectures in streaming video format, shall be presented to candidates only when a proficient lecturer is not available. These lectures shall be streamed from a private and secure source only to the Lodge Secretary, accessed through a link in our membership software. (Added Section Sept 2024)

"For the purpose of discussion, I move that Resolution 6 be adopted."

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"It has been moved and seconded to adopt Resolution 6, We will now have the discussion, please use the procedures as before. First in favor of the resolution"

Dan LaVine Past Master Spirit Lake 57 and current Master Rathdrum 41. I'm in favor of this and I actually coauthored it and there's a reason for that. I'm here for Masonry and the Brotherhood, but I'm also grateful to do the work. I believe having this type of access for the smaller lodges that possibly don't have someone within 30 or 40 miles of them to do their lectures. What do they do, postpone the degree? Do they do the degree and the get the lecture later? Having this access would open up that Lodge to new worlds and to the ability to do the work themselves, if nobody in that Lodge can do that. work. We are Masons and our Lodges are meant to make Masons. That is the technical definition of masonry, we are to gather together and make Masons. Everything else is Lodge culture. Anything we can do to further the making of Masons we need to do. We talked earlier about the loss of Masons that we are in negative numbers and we've been in negative numbers for a long time. Anything we can do to stem that tide should at least be at school. This isn't going to be a very popular thing among some of the guys that had to learn everything in those books. Everybody in this room that has a full Master's ticket. If you use Fellowcraft felt as one word and use trestle board as one word, it is 18,396 words you have to memorize to get your full Master's ticket. That is all the lectures, that is openings and closings. Basically, to do that and to remember it all requires an immense commitment. Having this for somebody who can't do that work, but still, we want to keep that Lodge going in the hope that it will grow. Rathdrum at one point we were sitting downstairs looking at the door hoping we have one more guy show us so that we can open the Lodge. We now have a median age in my lodge of 40 years old, that's the median, we've got younger guys that don't have the time to spend learning those 18,396 words, but we have guys that are working for our community. We have guys that are going out and doing good in the community. Not everybody has the time to run at this. Again, I understand that somebody that don't have the certificate like I do, yes, we put a lot of effort into it but we're also going to look at the numbers, based on decline in Idaho. This might help.

"Thank you, Brother Dan. First in opposition."

MWGM, I'm Jeremy Vaughn, Past Master of Twin Falls lodge #45. A couple of quick points about this. Number one, Brother, ask yourself, which one of you that actually knows the lecture wants to be the one that's going to volunteer to be recorded so that you can do this? Two, the resolution talks about hosting it through our membership software. So I asked the question, can Grandview do that? The answer is no, they don't have the capability of doing that through Grandview. So, then a suggestion was made when we could do it on a private YouTube channel, because that would only be accessible to our membership which have the link and every employee of YouTube that has access to the content that's hosted there because they don't post anything that they don't have access to. So, does that mean we're not going to invest in the IT infrastructure to build the ability to stream these lectures? I don't want to go even further, guys. There's a number of gentlemen that I

know, with all due respect to an illustrious Sir that joined the Scottish Rite during the pandemic when they were doing the video conferrals and the members that I helped bring them through that have struggled with wanting to come back to the Scottish Rite because they thought it was a lackluster experience. Even though it was very well done and I watched those videos, they were well done. Gentlemen, I get the problem. I've been the guy sitting in the car going two hours plus to the lodge one way and snowy weather to help put on the work. But you know what? that's part of what I talked about in my oration about building our bonds of Brotherhood. It's work, Masonry is work and I recognize the challenges that we have, but this isn't the solution guys. Thank you.

"2nd in favor."

Thank you MWGM, Greg Winther PGM. If you look at this resolution you'll see my name on it, and I wanted to tell you why my name is on it. I am very concerned not only about the loss of membership, but that pales in comparison to the loss of the Lodges. We have lost 27 Lodges since I was Grandmaster, I've been a witness to this. Like Jeremy said earlier in his oration; to make a Mason, you need a Lodge? Now this is a plea for help, not necessarily with the video, but it's a plea to have ideas. Brainstorm on how we can best assist these lodges that are struggling so that they don't become another negative statistic. Three resolutions were put together, the best ideas that I could come up with, but I'm not that bright. I need help, I'd like your ideas on how we can help struggling Lodges. Many of the men that speak against something like this are from the more populous parts of the state. Well, just take it as an example, I have made a point of visiting lodges that are one death away from closing. Whether it's a video is immaterial. We've got to start passing legislation that benefits these lodges that are struggling so we don't lose any more of that. And if the video is something you feel strongly about, great. If you don't like it, that's fine too. But let's come up with some ideas. Thank you.

'Thank you, brother. Second, in opposition to the proposed resolution."

MWGM, Distinguished guests, and all right. Brian Becker Coeur D' Alene 20. I am in one of those small lodges and we end up borrowing help from other lodges and that builds the camaraderie between us. The other thing that we're missing is that by memorizing these lectures, you learn more about master yourself so that when you convey that knowledge to a candidate, you convey it with a conviction because you understand it better. And if questions come up later, you can say you can explain what those various parts are. I mean, it's one of the fun parts about masonry. You watch a degree and a number of times and one day you notice something you hadn't noticed before. You memorized one of the lectures, and all of a sudden you discovered some other aspect that you hadn't seen before. Those are things we end up discussing with our brethren. I remember going through the Scottish Rite when it was all memorized. It was beautiful. I went through Eastern Star when it was memorized, and I was really impressed, and I didn't go into it thinking I'd be impressed, but the fact that they had done that work and had studied it, memorized it, I was impressed with that. Our distinguished brethren are trying to indicate that we're losing members because we have to memorize something. Well, should we get rid of them memorizing what the working tools are, should we just have everything in the book we hand to them and go, oh this is going to be amazing. Congratulations. We keep shortening it. that's not going to make it any better. We've been making it easier since the 60s. We just have to be more active in our community. I helped the Grand Lodge of Montana go through 150 years of stuff for their museum. None of the programs worked, they all played out. The thing that did work was the Brother talking to a Brother and those individuals talking to those in the community. That's what gets our membership, that's what gets these people motivated and that's what gets people to want to memorize the work. Thank you.

"Thank you, Brother. one last in favor of the resolution. There are two people moving towards the mic, only one could speak. in my lodge doesn't even have anything. No, that's true. That's why I'm asking everyone to queue up. We don't. We shouldn't have to wait for people to walk up to the mark."

David Main Kaniksu 97. I don't usually talk up in front of crowds too well, but I've been to degrees in Washington just cross the border from the Southern Newport and all their lectures are recorded with video that I watched. Does that make the Washington guys any less amazing? I don't think so. We've got a lot of people, but we want the younger crowd, but the younger crowd are working 40, 60, 80 hours a week just to make a living right now. Are we going to help them or are we just going to let it go?

"Thank you, Brother. Is there a 3rd speaker against?"

MWGM, Howie Bloom still Past Master of Asher 29. To paraphrase Hiram King of Tyre, for like reasons as before, this resolution should not be passed. It takes away the one-on-one. Putting a TV or a Big Screen in front of the candidate and doing that, but it takes away that one-on-one. We're trying new ways to help the lodges, I think of Brother Greg and Brother Dan as friends, and I don't like speaking against these resolutions that my friends have put forth, because I do believe they are looking for the betterment of Freemasonry. Past Master Grand Master Winther and I have spoken at length about better ideas. I don't think they're fully ripened ideas yet, but it helps us think and maybe in the future we'll have a better answer, but it is football season and when the football team was struggling, you know you don't continue with complicated plays, you go back to the basics. It was the basics that got us to where we were and the basics will get us back to where we want to be, which is. Is full of competent lecturers, competent people that can do the work, and that's going to be done by the one-on-one interaction with the mentor and the candidate. It's not going to be done by any sort of video or canned lecture, whether it's in the G or first, second or third degree.

"Thank you, brother. We've heard 3 for and 3 against, we're now going to vote all those in favor. Stand with your ballots. OK. Resolution 6 **FAILS**. We will now hear Resolution 7."

Resolution 7. Reads by-Law as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

By-Laws, Part Three, ARTICLE XI, CHARTERED LODGES, Section 1106 – Occasional Lodges:

Occasional Lodges. Lodges with memberships of thirty (30) or fewer members who reside within a twenty (20) mile radius of the Lodge, and are physically able to attend, may elect to amend their By-Laws to become an Occasional Lodge. Thereby, operating and being governed under the following changes to their Lodge's Bylaws.

- 1. Occasional Lodges are required to convene four (4) or more stated meetings annually, with the presence of a quorum of seven (7) Brothers, three of whom must be members of that Occasional Lodge (Section 920).
- 2. Of these stated meetings one must be in November (Section 1601, Election), one in December (Section 1504 and 1505, Delinquent Members), one in the spring and one before Grand Lodge. There may be unlimited called meetings to conduct activities permitted by this Code and Digest.
- 3. The specific date and time of each of the Stated meetings must be detailed in the Lodge's By-Laws.
- 4. All other Constitutional Provisions, By-Laws and Regulations shall apply in the governing of the Occasional Lodge with the exception of those listed above.

"To put the resolution on the floor, I move that Resolution7 be adopted."

"I'll take 3 for and 3 against. Please queue up"

MWGM, Dan LaVine Rathdrum 41. This is another resolution that I co-authored. Everything that you've been experiencing, my want, my goal here is to simply the betterment of Masonry in Idaho. Having been the Master for the very, very large lodge and then after the very small lodge. The rationale here is this. If you have been seated at the dinner table and stared down your driveway of your lodge hoping one more car show up so you'll be able to open lodge to do your business. You understand that sometimes it would have been better to not show up than suffer that despair, than hanging out around the dinner table just to go home without having done anything other than talking to your Brothers. By making it so that those called communications can happen when we know we will have Brothers, rather than being forced to try to open doors when we know don't have if we have enough Brothers that can attend. There are a lot smaller logical brothers who belong to larger ones. This is not going to sound like it makes sense, but some of the Lodges up here in the North can't open on their own and required Brothers from other Lodges to be able to open. These smaller Lodges will now to be made to shut their Lodges down, is that what we want? Brother Greg mentioned that Lodge are dwindling form 70 something in the 40 something, do we want that to continue? If you have a Lodge that meets 4 times a year for stated meetings, everything else can be a called communication when you know you can get Brothers to show up. What harm has been done? This allows that Lodge to survive as it attempts to build again. I belong to a Lodge that had 21 members that our last meeting. At one point we had six and we're hoping for seven. We've built that. It can be done, but giving up on some lodges because they only have a few members now, I don't think it's a good idea. I believe this resolution or intuition would solve that problem

"Thank you, brother Dan, first opposition, is that Brian?"

Yes sir, MWGM, Distinguished Guests and Brethren all. One point which made the point of order, f I recall correctly, is that bylaws changes have to be read three times in the lodge. By the way this is written that won't be possible. My second thing is I believe that this can all be done with just the bylaws change in the lodge. If they only want to meet 5 times or six times or whatever the magic number is, they can do a by-laws change. Again, I'm a seven-time Pass Master. Two of those have been these small lodges where if we get a quorum, we're very thankful. No doubt about it. I built them up at times and I've watched them go back down and borrowed from other brethren. I wish we had 21 people showing up at our Lodge meetings, but I I think this is already covered in the Code & Digest. I don't know how you're going to read the bylaws 3 times when you're only going to be able to meet twice before Grand Lodge. This may need to be amended on the floor. Thank you.

Thank you, Brother. Is there another in favor.

MWGM, Distinguished Guest Brother all, my name is Skylor Lentz Junior Warden of Boise 2. As Boise rapidly grows, the Lodge sits at a city brimming with opportunity. The population has grown 24% since 2010 to 2020, and it's projected to surpass. 1,000,000 in 2024 and that's from the US Department of Statistics and the Idaho Department of Labor. With Boise's 2.4% unemployment rate and 64% growth in the tech sector, members are busier than ever and that's from the Bureau of Labor Statistics. And the Idaho Technology Council. Let's ensure this law stays alive and remains a source of light for those striving to improve themselves in the community. Boise 2 has been a noted downward ebb since COVID, but that doesn't constitute there should be a threat for risk foreclosure. We have strength in our passion for number 2 to remain alive for the opportunity to return to a healthy flow and growth. In my interpretation of the Grand Orators words, Masons are made in a Lodge and the fellowship outside the lodge gives depth to the Brotherhood. Keep the tie to the Lodge and the connection of the Brothers and the community. I propose we vote in favor of the occasional Lodge. This will keep our Lodge more accessible and engaged, allowing us to better share with the community at large. Let us vote in favor for this motion and ensure Boise 2 and other Lodges continues to grow and thrive alongside our vibrant community, our vibrant city. Thank you.

[&]quot;Thank you, Brother Skylor. A second in opposition, Brother Dave."

Dave Thomas, Past Master Salubria 31 and Weiser 23. Small lodges, Payette, Weiser, Cambridge, and I think Butte 37 in Emmett has probably got more members but anyway. This has basically brought together the small Lodges by having the support one another. So we travel, we all traveled back and forth during Lodge nights. It's very simple, it's 30 miles to Cambridge or it's 10 miles to Payette for us guys in the middle, but the guys from Cambridge also come down. The death now of lodges was the ending of meeting twice a month and now only being required to meet once a month, why? What did this do for us? Talk to the Lodges that are successful. They do the same thing we do and I think we're pretty successful. Up in Cambridge. I think we've made 3 or 4 new Masons. What we do is we meet every Thursday night and talk with the exception of our monthly meeting . When we get together, we might talk about the farming or somebody might say I'd like to work on stuff and we'll do that. You have to work with somebody on his proficiency. I don't see any reason to be ashamed about missing a meeting if you're a four meeting a month guy. But if you meet once a month and you've missed two or three meetings of going to lodge, Lodge then seems to fall off or your calendar. Thank you.

"Thank you, brother Dave. second in favor."

MWGM, "Brother John", the next Brother has a question on language in the resolution.

Julian Wheeler, Junior Warden Shoshone Lodge 25. As often as I can I attend meetings at Cataldo Lodge 34 and Coeur D' Alene 20 and it's good to see brethren from here beyond, I wanted to raise a point of order There was a notion going around that it's only 4, but it does say in subparagraph 1, Occasional Lodges are required to have four or more stated meetings annually. So, they can actually do once a month if they want. This doesn't press them down to four, it's at least it's a floor of 4. Thank you.

"Thank you for your point of order." "Another in favor of the resolution, this will be #3"

Hello Brethren, I'm Steve Crane from Lakeside 42. I'm also Past Master of Topeka 17, Topeka, Kansas. About 15 years ago, the Grand Lodge of Kansas was experiencing the same issues where we had Lodges that were having a tough time. So' what the usual reaction is that we merge too much, so we merge the lodge here and we merge a lodge there together. The problem is when we merge those lodges, there was 50 miles between one lodge and the other. The guys who got merged from this lodge into Lodge B, they never went. We lost those Brothers. So about 15 years ago, we created this occasional lodge process and it has worked like a charm. And we've had more than a third of those lodges that have come back to life. They found the missing brothers. They found that one brother who could, you know, get in the lodge and charge things up and get people going again and bring in new members. And it's saved a bunch of lodges in the state of Kansas.

"Thank you, Brother Steve. Last in opposition, Brother Jeremy."

MWGM, Jeremy Vaughn, Past Master Twin Falls Lodge 45. Couple of points. One, when we define the lodges that this applies to as lodges with 30 or fewer members who reside within 20 miles and I dare say it is safe to look at the directory, that's 3/4 of the Lodges in Idaho. So there we are guys. This is not about those of us in opposition wanting to close Lodges, in fact, it's the furthest from the truth. One of my real concerns with this resolution is. One, as was stated earlier, this could be addressed by a Lodge amending its bylaws to specify how many times it wants to meet. Two, if you say that they're 4 times they that they have to meet, but then you specify when those four have to meet or which at least two of the four have to meet per this resolution. You're hamstring that Lodge's ability to do a number of things that our Code & Digest predicates upon the passage of time between stated meetings, such as reception of petitions, investigation of petitions, balloting on petitions. So now you're hamstring that Lodge's ability to grow because you cannot read or act on a petition at a called meeting. Number tow how many folks have actually read our disciplinary process in our code? There's an awful lot of stuff in our disciplinary code that has to do with happening at stated meetings or the passage of time to another stated meeting in order to have the trial process and also deal with the appeal process. This hamstring that as well. While I think the idea of giving the Lodges these tools to rebuild

themselves as a good one. I think there are flaws in this resolution as built, that are creating other problems that are not on its face and I think we should come back next year with the better idea. Thank you.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"Brother, we've heard 3 in favor and 3 opposed to the resolution. We will now vote on resolution #7 All those in favor, please stand with your ballots. OK, brother, we sit down. Those opposed, please stand for ballots. The resolution **FAILS**." "We will now hear Resolution 8."

M.: W.: John Warner, PGM / Jurisprudence Chairman

Resolution 8, this is a very simple one. This particular resolution modifies a bylaw based on of the approval of that Constitutional Amendment that will go to the Lodges at the end of this Grand Session. So, if this particular resolution was to pass, it would automatically be in conflict. Therefore, has been returned to Mount Moriah Lodge. They are authorized to bring it back again next year if the pending Constitutional Amendment passes. While I'm on that Resolution 10, the same thing happens. There was a conflict. Resolution 10 was also returned to the authors who may resubmit if the pending Constitutional it affects is passed. So, we're going to be discussing and voting on Resolution 9.

Resolution 9. Reads by-Law as intended to read in the Code and Digest:

By-Laws, Part two, ARTICLE XVI, OFFICERS, ELECTIONS, INSTALLATIONS, Section 1603 - Eligibility of Officers

A Wardens Certificate of Proficiency requires a Brother to demonstrate his proficiency in opening and closing Lodge in all three degrees, conduct a stated communication and pass the designated examination on Masonic Law. To be eligible for election as Warden of a Lodge, a Brother must possess a Wardens Certificate of Proficiency; or a Worshipful Masters Certificate of Proficiency; or a Secondary Worshipful Masters Certificate of Proficiency; or be a Master or Past Master of a Constituent Lodge of this Grand Jurisdiction. Installed Wardens, serving at least one year as a Warden of a Chartered Lodge of this Grand Jurisdiction, or after serving as Warden or Master of a Lodge under dispensation in this grand Jurisdiction, and after receiving this Certificate, such Brother is eligible for election as Worshipful Master. A Brother after serving in this capacity, shall be considered a Past Master and a permanent voting member of Grand Lodge. Individuals who are already in possession of a Wardens certificate prior to October 1, 2009, must pass the designated examination prior to being installed as Worshipful Master. (Revised Sept 2024)

"For the purpose of discussion, I move that Resolution 9 be Adopted."

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"It has been moved and seconded to adopt resolution 9, We will now have the discussion, please use the procedures as before. First in favor of the resolution" Let's queue up. Looks like the first in favor is PGM Sherman Burger."

MWGM I am not speaking in favor or against the amendment, but I have a question for Jurisprudence on why this Amendment is not in conflict with the Constitution. The Constitution sets who the permanent voting members of Grand Lodge are, and they are Past Masters with either of the Master's Certificate of Proficiency, this bylaw amendment then adds to that the Wardens that have been elected as Worshipful Master, and to me that seems to be a conflict.

The Constitution is clear that for a brother to become a Master, he must have a Master's certificate. He must also learn and know the ritual of Idaho. Within that same context, we must ask what is ritual? Opening and closing the lodges is ritual, a Senior Warden gives an apron lecture in the degrees is ritual. The Constitution does not say how much ritual he must learn, only that he must learn Idaho ritual. Secondly, the only one that

can certify a brother to receive a Worshipful Master Certificate is a District Deputy Grand Master. He has two ways currently to do that, he certifies the Master can do all the work all the work to qualify for a certificate, or not. When he certifies the Brother did the work, he sends the certification to the Grand Secretary. The Grand Secretary then issues a certificate based on certification of the District Deputy Grand Master. The process is the same for a Secondary Worshipful Masters Certificate. Now we come to this resolution. The District Deputy Grand Master has to verify that the Brother has met the requirements of proficiency to give him a Wardens Certificate. The second requirement, after learning the ritual, is that he must serve a year as a Warden. The District Deputy must review and certify that he has met those requirements, then he sends the certification to the Grand Secretary, that the individual is eligible for the Wardens Certificate, and the Grand Secretary issues the certificate. He now has a certificate that meets the requirement of the Code and the Jurisprudence Committee determined based on that, that it is eligible to go to the floor and the membership has the right to vote. Thank you.

"Thank you. 1st in favor of the proposed resolution."

Worshipful Master and Brethren, Robin Stanley Shoshone Lodge 25 and Cataldo 34. I've been coming to Grand Lodge for over 50 years and I've been a Master of either Shoshone or Cataldo for 36 years. So, I know what it's like being a Master of a small Lodge that is struggling and I can tell you in my heart, in over 50 years coming to Grand Lodge, there's two things that have stood out. Brian Becker and I have written a lot of legislation knowing it was never going to pass, because Grand Lodge doesn't pass new creative ideas. It takes literally years to get Grand Lodge to move on anything. I was a school administrator for 47 years, teacher, principal, Superintendent, and one of my favorite sayings was if you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've always got. So, if you keep doing what you're doing, you're going to come up with the same results. Science says it's great. Jeremy, stop. Sorry, Einstein says it's crazy to think if you keep doing the same thing to expect a different outcome. In my 50 years I've only seen Grand Lodge take one action that has helped the rural Lodges. 1 in 50 years and I'm not going to tell you what the one thing is, but if you can come up with more than one thing, the Grand Lodge has passed that helped small lodges. I want you to bring it to me and I'll feel better about Grand Lodge because I don't feel very good about being able to bring anything and getting Grand Lodge to move. Because this Grand Lodge is just in a rut. We know what Washington does, we know what other states do, and we know what Kansas does. But Idaho can't get out of the rut. I knew 20 years ago that we couldn't get stuff changed. Brother Winther points out that we are on a crash course. We're losing lodges, we're losing brothers, we've gone from 13,000 to less than 2000. If we always do what we've always done, we'll always get what we've always got. So, unless somebody changes, we're not going to exist. Thank you.

"Thank you, brother. First in opposition."

MWGM I am Dan Siddall Past Master Capital City 93 and the Grand Lecturer. I'm sympathetic to the arguments put forth today, but one of the things if we are a fraternity that is for the improvement of men. If we're a society that is for the improvement of me, then the way to improve is through our ritual. If we're not going to memorize it, which is our current way of us learning the lessons, we need to replace it with something else. In talking with my distinguished Brother from Paraguay, they do a bunch of writing papers and education that way. If we want to reduce the ritual, we really need to replace it with something else which then continues our lessons. If we're not going to replace it with something, we've just become the Elks or the Rotary Club because there's not, we're not doing the improvement that we're talking about. We're doing community activities. There are plenty of other organizations that do those things, so. Personally, I like Freemasonry, I like ritual, evidence by the fact that I'm the Grand Lecturer. I like the lessons and I think that we should improve this with lessons. I understand the small bodies are struggling getting enough qualified Masters, but if there's something in your lodge. Does not have a Master Certificate because I'm not willing to work on it. Then why doesn't the Master empower that person to run some stuff? Talking to the folks at Rathdrum yesterday, there's a young

man there that is not a Master, but they've had him run some of their charitable organizations. We do the same thing at Capital City, very often we put together a committee and the Master doesn't run the empowers folks to do those things to help energize the lodge and get them active in the community. There are other solutions other than reducing the ritual requirement. We're talking about now, how we can't do some of the lectures if you don't have to learn the lectures to Master, nobody is going to learn them. And we're going to be back to be reading it. That was my two cents.

"Thank you, Brother Dan, seconded in favor of the resolution".

MWGM and Brethren, no name given? This is my first year at Grand Lodge. This is my first year as Worshipful Master of my lodge. Really tough going after Dan Siddall I have to tell you. But anyway, I'm gonna try to muddle through this. Since this resolution was penned by a person in my Lodge who was not able to come. He made several points even though I don't have the experience that you gentlemen have, yet. I would like to go through so of those points. Through an affiliate member, 34 Grand Lodges in different states were polled in 22 of the 34 Grand Lodges, which replied that they require a member to serve one year as a Senior Warden in their lodge to become eligible to be Grand Master. Two months, in one year as a Warden that opened and closed at all degrees. Attend a 2- or 3-day Wardens class. If you look at the resolution, you'll see a pie chart and all that information right there. It's not in the summary, but it's in the actual resolution. Our largest need leadership and they also have Lecturers. They don't have to be exclusive to each other. I mean, you don't have to be a good leader to be a lecturer. You know, to be a good lecturer, be a leader. You can be one or the other. And just in my short term so far as Worshipful Master, I found that this position is primarily about leadership and administration, much less than the lecturing part. Now we do need lecturers,100%. I just got my limited Master's Certificate, and I am very proud of that. Now. I think I want to go for my full ticket and hope that others will have the responsibility to do that. Thank you.

"Thank you, brother. Second in opposition".

George Decker Silver City 13. I am from one of the small rural Lodges, we are there by the grace of God, because without the people that come from Star, Middleton, and Boise our Lodge would have closed. When we have people in our lives that who are no longer eligible because they are in the line, they're working full time or other junk. They're in five different lodges and they're already sitting Masters or sitting Wardens. I had to step up, yes I only have the secondary Master's Certificate. I had to scramble hard to do that in 60 days but, I got it done. I'm not going to say it was pretty, but I got it done, and I am working towards getting my full meal deal so that I can move on. I don't mean to move on as in my life. I just mean be there to do the work that everyone else seems to do. I'm not a great speaker. I flub my lines all the time, but I'm trying. Whether it's 18,000 words or 25,000 words, I'm going to get there. Thank you.

"Thank you, brother George. In favor of resolution."

Thank you Most Worshipful, Greg Winther PGM. This is a bummer, look who's going after me. He's going to do clean up. It is an old lawyer's trick, I think. When we talk about small lodges, I'm thinking of lodges that have a Master and a membership that comes that is over the age of 75. Membership has been and may have been leaders in their industries, but at 75 their memories will not let them even approach the certification. I've got a close friend in mind. I don't know the size of the Lodges that most of you are from. But how many of you are one death away from closing? I've got one there, I've got 1 here, I've got 2 back there. One death from closing, we've already lost 27. When we lose a lodge, we lose the opportunity to make Masons, we lose the opportunity to be an influence in our community. We lose the opportunity for those men that had me coming to lodge have a lodge to come to because as you heard earlier, and I can attest to this. When 2 lodges merge, 1 disappears. It's just the way it's been. Anyway, in a resolution like this here, I'm not speaking directly to the resolution, but I'm speaking to the idea. That we need conserve our lodges. OK. Thank you for listening.

"Thank you, Brother Greg. Final and opposition, Brother Jeremy."

MWGM, Jeremy Vaughn Pass Master Twin Falls Lodge 45. First, my question is why do we always keep characterizing this as small lodges versus large lodges? I'm a member of the lodge of about 100 Master Masons, and I remember an election not that long ago. We have one Brother and only one Brother, to elect into the Master's chair. We have got 100 Master Masons, I also know, some of our "smaller lodges" with a third of their guys or better which have Master Certificates. It's really not an issue of the population of your lodge. I talked earlier about the statistics on how many tickets were actually issuing, we can have that debate over a cocktail later. I have some concerns about this legislation as written, as you look at it, it talks about modifying the Warden Certificate of proficiency, and with reference to our learned friends on the Jurisprudence Committee. Article 2, section one of our Constitution talks about having a Worshipful Master Certificate of Proficiency. What this resolution is purported to do is that a person with a Warden's Certificate of Proficiency can be elected Master of their Lodge. I submit that from my reading it does create an issue with the Constitution. Perhaps the way to start this conversation is when you talk about a Constitutional Amendment to address these issues of what certificates are required and what are not. Gentleman, I get the sentiment, I've been in a situation of trying to save Lodges, but Lodges go through their life cycles. I submit that perhaps there are other things we need to talk about as a fraternity, is what is the life cycle of the lodge, and why do we make it so hard to open a new Lodge? Why don't we make it so it's a little easier, like our friends overseas in the UK, where they open new Lodges or close Lodges as required, it's the life cycle, but we do it for the good of Masonry. It's a continuous change. Thank you.

"Thank you, Brother. Jeremy. We've heard three in favor and three opposed to the resolution. All those in favor of the resolution stand with the voting cards, all opposed. Resolution 9 **FAILS**." "Thank you, Brother John, and good work Jurisprudence. I appreciate your work."

Announcements:

"I thank the Grand Lodge for consideration in allowing me to run resolutions pass the published closing time. We'll make sure the visiting Grand Masters and other representatives will have time to speak tomorrow morning. We have an introduction to do for Grand Master of Ted who got in from Nevada today so, we'll do that in the morning. There will be a hospitality suite tonight in room 178 in the B wing of the facility, we are still working on a room for Friday night. Jesse, really quickly, say, what time you will open the Hospitality room?"

MWGM, I was given notice by Junior PGM Sherm Burger that the Past Grand Masters Association will be meeting in the hospitality room. So, guys, as much as I would like to open up the hospitality room, I'm not going against the Past Grand Masters.

"Let me let me clarify this. I'm going to let them do the announcement. Then, I need to know from you when the hospitality suite will be opened for everybody."

Past Grand Masters Association will meet at 4:00 pm, in Room 178. All past Grand Masters, all sitting Grand Masters, including you, Brother Gary, are invited to attend. Brother Gary, if you don't attend that, we will send out a search party.

Thank you, Sir. And as soon as that's over, we'll start up the hospitality room. So again, the hospitality room will be open sometime after 4:30 in room 178 and B Wing.

I charged the Masons in Arizona to go back and read their obligations and understand the words that are there. Just because you have memorized it doesn't mean you really know what it says. Honor those in the authority by actively listening, genuinely listening to others. Make eye contact, avoid interrupting, and provide constructive feedback when necessary. Pay compliments by acknowledging the positive qualities of others. Be kind, considerate, and polite. Show empathy. Then try to understand other's perspectives. Patience demonstrates respect for others, time, and feelings. Courage: Those acting despite feeling fear have the courage, to discuss Masonry with any person at any time, at any place. Develop your 15-minute elevator speech but don't talk about the history of Masonry because they can find that just about anywhere. Tell them why you joined and why you stayed. Courage, like the muscles in your body, can be developed. You can become more courageous with practice. Fear is an opportunity for growth rather than a hindrance. Instead of fighting fear, embrace it. Mindfulness helps you respond to fear with courage. Commitment: It's a powerful quality that can lead to various positive outcomes. Commit yourself to your lodge and become the Mason that all want to emulate. When you commit to something, you're more likely to follow through and achieve the goal. Commitment: Provides the necessary motivation and persistence to overcome obstacles and stay focused. Commitment plays a crucial role in all relationships. Being committed fosters trust, reliability, and loyalty. Commit to yourself to improvement. Learning new skills leads to personal growth and productivity. When you're committed, you're more likely to put forth the effort required to excel. When faced with challenges, commitment helps you to persevere, adapt, and find solutions rather than giving up. So, keep plugging away at problems that you have and eventually you will come to find a solution. I have two additional things I need assistance with. Arizona is losing some of its grant money. So, I'm trying to raise money by selling my Grand Master's coins for 20 bucks a piece. My goal is \$12,000 and I'm about halfway there. So, if you want one, see me, I'll let you have one. There are those of us who love it but not enough who can understand it. So anyway. I appreciate so much the hospitality that I received in Idaho. My wife couldn't be here with me today and she's a little upset about it. I had another officer who wanted to attend with me. He had to go to Kentucky instead. But I'm I know they'll be here next year. So, thank you, my Brethren, for showing me your hospitality here in Idaho. I really appreciate it. I invite you all to Nebraska next February and I believe it's 6th, 7th, and 8th and it could be cold. Thank you

You say well, we have trouble opening Lodge. Why is that? Is that Grand Lodge's fault? I doubt that, it is within your own Lodge. What kind of programs do you have for your brothers? Do you do good floor work or not? If your brother's not proud of that, then that's the problem. I think it starts with your ritual. Do good ritual work and the other brothers will go wow, this is pretty good, you know, maybe I need to be there. But look within yourself. If not for me, who will it be? Brothers, may he who watches

over you place his hand on your shoulder and give you peace and a safe journey home. Most Worshipful Thank you. Brothers, thank you so much.

Because every single one of us promised ever to walk an act as such. To take outside the lodge, that which you practice inside the lodge, continue to be the difference. When you hear the Grand Master's theme for the year. I want all the Brethren to think about themes from the Past Grand Masters that you've had. Think about how you can string those into something that can be your elevator speech because when you look at it, you can really build that arch of what is defined as Masonry because we always will continue to learn and change. One of the things that I did last night when I was sitting in my room. I wanted to go through and come up with how we as Masons can really have a conversation using Grand Master's themes. So what I strung together is this, as nations, we are taught to remember the past and visualize the future because change is the key to our future. We should have great expectations for our membership to be the difference, building bridges to provide light to those who seek it while we learn and change. To better communicate, to educate our membership so each and every Brother can walk the talk every day and in every way. Because we truly are one Masonic family living united, committed to knowing thyself first so that we can live the legend that is Freemasonry. Committed to being all in to ensure what we do will empower, enlighten and uplift those around you. That's 15 fifteen Past Grand Master's themes. The last one is mine and Empower, Enlighten, and Uplift, and I chose that as an AND. It's an AND to what we have had come before us. Because if we're empowering our brothers, because we see in them what they have yet to see in themselves, we're enlightening them into our history, into our fraternity, and why we are truly different. We made that commitment to truly be that difference. Ever to walk and act doesn't go away when we leave the Lodge room. When you look at the symbol of the Holy Saints John, every single one of us exemplified that symbol in its perfect picture when we took our Entered Apprentice journey. Once around the altar, at the altar with the brethren on both the sidelines. And when we made that first commitment, we made a commitment to be the change. Uplifting our brothers is what we committed to, in their hour of need, even when they don't know that they need, whether it's quietly sitting with them, being present with them, helping them, taking them to the airport at 4:00 in the morning. But that's who we are at our core. Sharing that with the outer world is something we committed to do. The legislation that we heard yesterday is a call for action. If

we learn and change within the parameters that are in each one of our jurisdictions. We have that opportunity to continue to grow because if we're providing good and wholesome instruction, when the brethren come to Lodge, we give them a reason to come back. Challenge them with something. Take your newest Master Mason, Fellowcraft, or Entered Apprentice Mason and give them the job because you can see, what they can do before they can see it. themselves. And if we continue to do that, understand that as we learn and change, when we're going through struggles and successes, you'll continue to build the fraternity one brother at a time, because that is what we're supposed to do. Take good men and make them better. But whether it's a large lodge or a small lodge, every brother adds value. Reach out to them if you have not seen them. I'll tell the story about what I learned a long time ago. When I became a Master in 2004, I challenged every single one of the Brothers, I split up our roster and asked them to call every single member of our lodge. I made one phone call that changed how I looked at Masonry. I talked to a Brother who was a Past Master who was at every single meeting. One time he couldn't make it to Lodge and he told me he never heard from anybody, so he took the next meeting off and never heard from anybody again he took a 3rd meeting off. Here is what he said to me, they didn't care because I've been at every meeting for five or six years straight and I missed one and I never heard from anybody in the Lodge. It is most imperative that we meet them where they're at, let them know that they are valued, ensuring they understand that they are an intricate part of your Lodge. And it's not up to anybody else to do that. It's up to all the Brethren of the Lodge to ensure that every Brother as a member of them knows we care and we're thinking about them whether they can make it or not. Most Worshipful, thank you for the travels and again to my host, thank you for the help. Right Worshipful we are so excited for tonight having fun as you travel as you start your journey.

"Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Tom Needham and Ogla had to leave early this morning, he's trying to make a Shrine ceremonial, and so it's a long drive back to Wyoming. So they won't be speaking this morning but Tom wanted me to give you thanks for all the love and support he's had here in Idaho. I would like the next hearing from the Symbolic Grand Lodge of Paraguay, Patrick Miller, the Deputy Grand Chancellor."

Patrick Miller, Deputy Grand Chancellor, Paraguay

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers dear Brethren all. I bring you greetings from Most Worshipful Grand Master Jose from the Symbolic Grand Lodge of Paraguay and I also bring the greetings from Right Worshipful Brother Richard Cooper, District Grand Master from the South American District, Southern Division, the United Grand Lodge of England. Very happy to be here Worshipful. First of all, thank you. Thank you for the hospitality you've shown me and to all the brethren and for the conversations we had, also the fellowship and close friendship offered. I would also like to thank you and Brother Sherman for the visit you made to us in Paraguay. And for the work you did for the appropriation of the recognition of our Grand Lodge. Also, I was thinking yesterday as we went through your proceedings and your discussions, we wanted to share. We do things different from what you do. We don't memorize ritual, but we do dedicate. We meet once a week. And then leave as an Entered Apprentice or as a Fellowcraft. There's another date you got to dedicate to learning ritual but learned the study the ritual, not from a perspective of memorizing, but from a perspective of knowing what it means, what it means inside of each one of us. So even though we do things differently, the essence of what we do is the same. I don't know if this is something that might help you or not. We have the opposite problems that you have. We need to build larger temples. Now we have to build this eight-story building to house more Masons or masonry is growing at rapid pace. So, we had different problems, but at the end we also have challenges as you do. On the other hand, in our English Lodges, we do things. We do have to memorize ritual. We do have to present papers in our Parguarian Lodges

in every lodge meeting. When we meet weekly, there must be at least two papers. And for us it's educational. When somebody reads an Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft or Master Mason reads a paper, it is in the pursuit knowledge, of course everybody could be there, but actually papers read the word is brought down to the valley and every brother could give his opinion or add to the knowledge of that paper. So by the end of the day, when you go home, you have something that you're taking, something of value you're taking. So for us, we basically are waiting for it to be Thursday to go to Lodge, we want to go to Lodge. It's something that we all like and it also creates a stronger bond between us because we meet every week. It's not every month, it's every week, so we get that bond with our Brother. Another thing that I've always seen in my travels in the US is that I don't know why, but. Here, your dues are extremely, extremely low. We paid \$1500 to be initiated, \$600 to be passed or raised. And we pay about \$50.00 a month in dues, half of that goes to the Grand Lodge, half of that stays with the lodge, and they're thinking of raising it a little more. Nobody has problems with that. If I offered a brother something and I don't value it, why would the brother value that? From our perspective, we have to value what the Craft offers. This is very important. The knowledge that is within our rituals and in our teachings is something you can't get it any other place. Most Worshipful thank you for having me here and again I have the Craft fills our spirits, but our Grand Master has sent some something to warm your spirits, a twenty-yearold rum to warm your spirits.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"Thank you, Brother Patrick, I'm go ahead and seat you from here. The trip to Paraguay was fantastic. They treated us like royalty. If you ever get a chance to go, you should go. Beautiful down there, Patrick, I was going to let you go to early but, when is the new Grand Lodge building going to be dedicated? Maybe next year. Is it going to be in the winter in Paraguay or the summer? Our winter is very short about one month only. We have we have nine months of heat and three months more heat. Well, you will have to let us know. I'd love to be there. Thank you.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

Are there any other distinguished guests that need to speak? I believe that we have concluded that. Brother Secretary, do we still need to receive the budget report, accounts and finance. Oh, yeah, let's go ahead and get your report on the Special Committee on Investigation of what needs to be done with the Grand Lodge office. Past Grand Master Greg Winther."

Building Committee

Greg Winther PGM

This has been a fantastic morning, I particularly enjoyed hearing from each one of the Grand Masters here. Do you realize that they represent not only domestic Grand Lodges, but three foreign Grand Lodges.

Alaska, (laughter) Paraguay and British Columbia/Yukon and it's wonderful to have everyone here. Earlier this year the Most Worshipful Grand Master approached a group of Masons, there were six of us, and asked us to be on a committee. To recommend what, if anything, should be done with the Grand Lodge officer. Now the committed consisted of the Chairman Will Vowtaw, Will are you here? There's Will right there. Michael Pearson. Who's the Deputy Director of Operations for Health and Welfare for the State of Idaho. He's in charge of the maintenance of all facilities with Health and Welfare. Will is an appraiser. Craig Bowls from Idaho Falls was appointed. He's a retired Navy See Bee Officer. Jay Soccer who does construction and consulting, and then myself, who is a real estate broker. The group of us met and here's our report. Each member contributed to the conversation according to his qualifications to consider these six options for the building. Number one, sell the building and buy another. #2 exchange the building and the trade for another. #3 sell the building and ranked #4 ranked the building to another party. #5 scared the building down and sell the lot. Number six, keep the building and invest in maintenance and improvements. After individual study, meetings and shared

discussions, we came to these conclusions #1. The condition of the real estate market has caused the value of the building to drop substantially, making it a very poor decision to sell. Compounding the poor market or high interest rates that will keep most buyers away from buying. #2 an exchange is a possibility and search. However, we were not able to find a suitable building that the owners were willing to trade. 3 Renting a new office. This is where Mike Pearson really shone. After a survey of rental costs, it is prohibitive and would soon exhaust the profits gained if it was sold. #4 Offering the building for rent to another entity is a possibility. This would require us to find suitable office space costing no more than the rent received. And this adds to the headache of being landlords and the expense of managing the rental. #5 Some brothers had the opinion that we could tear the building down and sell the lot for a greater profit. This combined experience of this committee recommends strongly against. The value of the property is to a great extent determined by its improvements. Tearing the building down would destroy this value of our investment, except in very rare occasions. Number six, lastly, the option that is recommended by this committee and that's keeping the Grand Lodge building and performing necessary maintenance and improvements. This will make the building usable and the maintenance will protect our investment until the market improves in the future. This recommendation is also supported by the fact that there is no monthly expense for the building other than utilities and maintenance. It is totally paid off. Further ADA County charges to the Grand Lodge no property tax on the property. It is 100%, exempt.

Fraternally Will Votaw, Chairman, Michael Pearson, Jay Soccer, Craig Boyles and Greg Winther and thank you for listening. I am asked to move with this report, be received, and put into the proceedings.

401-3 Accounts & Finances

Robbie Swofford

I was really hoping to able to follow the Brothers from Paraguay. But, it's been a really great year of being able to do this I have learned a lot about accounts financing and I would really recommend any Brother that wants to know a little more about it to volunteer for this committee, it's been fun. What I didn't understand is that I could be the most loved and hated person in one year. So let's get right down to it, we sent the budget out in May, with the bottom line we are not looking to raise capital. So, the budget for 2025 was diligently work on by the Grand Master, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Right Worshipful Senior Grand Warden, Right Worshipful Grand Secretary, Right Worshipful Grand Treasurer and the Committee. The budget was sent to the Worshipful Grand Secretary in May, it was distributed to Lodges in June and as I said, there is no increase in the lodge assessments and I move that this budget be adopted.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

It has been moved and seconded that we accept the Budget Committee's report. Is there any discussion? All in favor vote by raise hands, all opposed same sign; Wait Brother Eric Coryell you have a comment?

I have a question, I would like a little bit of explanation on the Grand Lodge building Grand Lodge office budget, you have building occupancy expenses of 6500 but maintenance and repairs at only 500. What do you consider occupancy expense? And we just had a report saying that you're going to need some improvements or something on the Grand Lodge office. I'm wondering how we're going to do that with this budget. Could you

please tell me what number you're talking about? Absolutely. That is 1951 and 1952. Hey. So, we're looking at the building occupancy expense, I believe that covers utilities and building up keep.

Greg Winther- Most Worshipful, "Brother Greg,"

Maybe I can clarify that in the reporting and not to mention what the maintenance and improvements would be. It's a very short list and inexpensive list. The first improvement is that the carpeting in the building is worn, it needs to be replaced. The second expense, it's more labor than expense and that's creating an office for the Grand Master, by shifting office equipment from one room to the other. Adding a locking mailbox on the front of the building. (Grand Secretary, the mailbox has been completed.) What else was on that list? The Grand Secretary has requested a partition, but in a later conversation with him, he informed me that he has created that wall himself with file cabinets and so that is no longer needed. The improvements we were speaking about are quite minor, and we will be covered by this plan. Thank you

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"Brother Eric, is your question answered on the occupancy line item. (Yes) Brethren for additional points of clarification. Some major repairs occurred about a decade ago and they're they were done under special assessment. We have no slush fund to slowly build up a war chest to fund future large line-item maintenance costs. I'll give the roof as an example and it's a recommendation to future Accounts & Finance Committees that we need to start doing a small yearly assessment to develop a war chest just to take care of potential major repairs such as the roof. We weren't able to get on the roof and see when the roof was actually installed, but that's a single membrane and we weren't able to find the certificate of compliance and therefore the guaranteed life of the roof. But those roofs are about a twenty-year roof and that they have to be replaced every twenty-years whether you think it does or not. That's something I would recommend to the future Accounts & Finance Committees that we need to do a nominal special assessment in the budget to build up a war chest for that. Another thing I think that we should address is the need to be some painting done into for the offices. For those who have been to the Grand Lodge Office, can see the wallpaper is very dated. I personally think it needs to be brightened up a little bit, it is pretty dark and gloomy in the building. Thank you, Brethren." "Brother Sherm."

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brother Robbie, there's still a line item in the budget for Grant Secretary retirement of \$15,000. \$10,000 of that goes to Joe Hanig, who last year at our Grand Lodge was reported to be in poor health and probably wouldn't be with us much longer. \$5,000 goes to Vern Patrick. I made it a special question for the Brethren last year whether or not this item should be continued even though that the funds that we are spending are way beyond what the Grand Lodge back in the mid-1980s authorized for their retirements and at that time the Brethren chose to continue it for another year. Do we have an update on how much longer we can expect to be paying these amounts, which in my opinion we're not part of the retirement granted to the Grand Secretary at the time. Brother, we did discuss this and because of the vote of the Brothers last year and with those two brothers still receiving those we left it in the budget and unless the Brothers want to bring it up for another vote. That's why we left it in the budget. I'm sorry Robbie that wasn't my question. My question was, do we have any idea how much longer we're going to be paying this? These deposits are all made by direct deposit, Brother Joe's out of state, are we even doing anything to make sure that he's still alive to receive these payments? I have not.

"Dave Smith"

The answer on Joe Hanig, He is hanging on, my wife contacted him and his wife probably about a month ago and he is still hanging on. I'm surprised that he has lasted this long.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Gary A.S. LaBruyere

"Thank you, Brother. Any further questions? Robbie, thank you and your committee. I know it's a tough job. Rick, thank you. All the brothers on the committee, Brother Grand Treasurer, Brother Grand Secretary. I know that that is a very hard job to do. Thank you so much. You're dismissed. Right. Are there any other questions? If not, we'll proceed to vote, all in favor accepting the accounts and finance and budget for the next year. Raise your and with the ballots. Those opposed same sign passes. It passes. Thank you, brethren."

"Brother Senior Grand Warden, are you ready for the Low Twelve Fund report?"

404-6 Low Twelve Fund

Randy King

Most Worshipful Grand Master. In the Low Twelve Fund there are currently 76 living members. We had one brother passed away during the last term from last Grand Lodge to this Grand Lodge. At the current time we have. \$7825.05 in our checking account that is at the DL Evans bank and we have a time certificate that is maturing valued at \$56,314.41. We are solid. Our By-laws right now direct \$500 payout on the death, so there's more than adequate funds to pay everything out. I am having some discussion with some people trying to figure out a way to maybe re-energize it to get more members, we did pick up a few during the last year, and at the same time change the By-laws, to put members of the fund in as directors. We are also considering changing the payout based on where we're at today, so. With that, I would recommend that this report be received.

This is a good program and it has been successful in several other Masonic organizations. Report of the Code & Digest Committee

Section 403 Special Committees: Code & Digest

Report of the Idaho Code and Digest Review Committee September 19, 2024

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Idaho Grand Lodge,

After his installation as Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Gary Labruyere appointed a committee to review the Idaho Code and Digest. This committee consists of Joe Alexander PGM and chairman, Mike Sutton PGM, Keith Brooks PGM, and Jim Voyles PGM. Committee kickoff emails were sent out in January 2024. These emails presented the guidelines for review and how to interpret certain words used in the Code and Digest, so the committee was on common ground.

The Process – the chairman set the following review guidelines. We are to review the Idaho Masonic Code and Digest for the purpose of identifying errors, omissions, and conflicting provisions. That all were interpreting words in the same manner the following guidelines were provided.

- 1. The words may, could, and should are to be considered as indicating something optional.
- 2. The words shall, will, and must indicate that it is a requirement to be performed.

Each committee member began reading at the Introduction on page 6 through the end of the Constitution. This gave us the necessary basis to review the Bylaws portion of the Code and Digest. The Bylaw articles were divided as follows:

- 1. Joe Alexander Article I through Article V
- 2. Jim Voyles Article VI through Article X
- 3. Mike Sutton Article XI through Article XV
- 4. Keith Brooks Article XVI through Article XX

That gave each committee member 5 Articles to read. The Penal Code and Regulations were left until after the bylaw Article review was complete. The committee agreed to meet by telephone conference call on Tuesdays at 3:00 pm. The Chairman distributed an agenda for each teleconference. Items of interest were discussed in accordance with the agenda. The committee also agreed that an 8 ½" X 11" format would now be the standard for the Code and Digest. By using this common format, it will save printing costs and updating time. The Chairman maintained the Master copy of the Code and added all changes in review mode in Word.

Changes and Updates

- Formatted to 8 ½" X 11" in MS Word.
- Made punctuation and spelling changes as recommended by Word.
- Wrote and submitted a resolution to change Section 103, Annual Communications. The resolution removes the Sesquicentennial paragraph and adds language to determine the Annual Communications rotation differently than before.
- Wrote and submitted a resolution to change Regulation 10, Concordant and Appendant Orders, Clubs and Associations, Recognition and Regulations. The resolution removed the list of recognized bodies from the Regulation and gives it to the Grand Secretary to maintain. This way if that list changes, no resolution is required. The existing language of Regulation 10 was clarified and organized so the process for recognition is all that is contained in Regulation 10.
- For consistency, changed the title of Section 919 from *Removal of Lodges* to *Lodges, Change of Meeting Place*. This title had been changed in two different places in the Index prior to our review.
- In Section 2019, Degree Proficiency, the word *key* was removed and updated to *The Sermons within the Idaho Monitor*.
- The Regulations were renumbered, some titles updated, blank Regulations removed and the entire Regulations section alphabetized.
- Regulation 38 was rewritten to include the Braille key. The title was changed from *Written Esoteric Work* to *Keys, Esoteric Work*.
- A redundancy was found in Regulation 39, 3. Since Regulation 39 clearly states that the Idaho Monitor includes the abbreviated esoteric work, the Committee agreed that the words *and esoteric work* should be removed from Regulation 39, 3.
- The Penal Code resolutions approved at the Grand Lodge Communication in 2023 were added to the existing Penal Code so the committee could review an accurate copy.
- The Committee recommends that the forms be put back into the Code and Digest. Not as part of the Code and Digest, but as reference and also marked as SAMPLE.
- The Committee discussed and agreed to removing the page numbers from the Table of Contents and the Index. The user will now find the wanted information by Article and/or Section number.
- Regulation numbers 24, 36, 37, 42, and 69 were removed and the Regulations were renumbered using automatic renumbering in MS Word. There were 14 references in the body of the Code and Digest that were changed when the renumbering took place.
- The Committee reviewed the Penal Code and Articles 33 and 34. No changes were recommended.
- The Committee agreed on the how the new Code and Digest should be printed. Print one copy for each Lodge Secretary, the Grand Secretary, each District Deputy Grand Master, and each elective Grand Lodge Officer. Anyone else that wants a copy will print one on their own. All future updates will be the responsibility of the person in possession of a hard copy. The Grand Secretary will continue to publish the revision page at the beginning of the Code and Digest.
- For consistency in the balloting process section, where black ball was used, it was changed to black cube. Except in one place where it explains that black cubes are better to use than black balls. The committee recommends that all changes made as outlined above be adopted by the voting delegates of this Grand Lodge. If there are any questions or concerns the Committee welcomes those at this time. There being nothing more, the committee moves that this report be adopted and referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence.

The review committee has found four resolutions for future submission and thanks the Most Worshipful Grand Master for our appointment to this committee. The opportunity to serve this Grand Lodge is appreciated.

Report of the Jurisprudence Committee (Final Report)

MW Grandmaster. RW Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge officers and Brothers all. To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Idaho. We, the Committee on Jurisprudence, respectfully submit the following report. Grandmasters Report. We concur with the appointment of all appointed Grand Lodge officers, District Deputy Grand Masters and committees. Dispensations: We concur with all the dispensations that were granted by the Grandmaster, except for dispensation #1. Fidelity Lodge 80 requested to move their stated meeting from October 17th, to October 18th, 2023, to align with the Most Worshipful Grand Master, s visit, to save time, utilities, and reduce travel. The Grand Master approved this for the good of the Craft. Article 3, Section 301, Powers and Authority for the Grand Master item 7 gives the Grandmaster the power to grant such other dispensations for the good of the craft. As not contrary to the Constitution or the landmarks. Section 920 requires all constituent lodges to specify in their bylaws their stated meeting times. Section 706. States no lodge may suspend their bylaws. The request to change the meeting date is a violation of Section 706 and the Grandmaster should not have approved this request. Lodges are reminded that their lodge bylaws are not to be suspended and they should include provisions to adjust their stated meetings should conflicts occur like this in the future. This is a common occurrence for many Grand Masters and a lot of times, we believe it is for the good of the craft and we could approve it, but in this particular case, by code we're not allowed to. Amendments to the Bylaws: We concur with all the changes to the bylaws approved by the Grand Master, as well as we concur with the disapproval of the Meridian Lodge's request. Official Action Decisions We concur with all the official acts and decisions of the Most Worshipful Grand Master. Building Dedications: We applaud the Grand Master on the building dedications for the Paradise Public Pavilion Building and the Adams County Health Center in Council. Visits: We congratulate and commend the Grand Master on all the visits he was able to make. Grandmasters Recommendations We concur with the Grandmaster's recommendations, which should not require legislation or funding. All matters involving funding were properly referred to Accounts and finances. Resolutions and Questions: The Committee incorporates the preliminary report of the Jurisprudence Report on Resolutions and Questions submitted on September 3, 2024, except for Question 4, which is included in this report. The Grand Secretary's report: We have reviewed the report of the Grand Secretary and found nothing that requires committee action. Other reports We have reviewed the reports submitted by the Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Treasurer and found nothing in these reports that requires any action by the committee. Response to question 4. Question 4 came on Article 10 and 11 in regards of obtaining and maintaining a charter. Article 10 deals with the formation of a lodge. Section 1004 Certificate of Proficiency requirement states no dispensation shall be issued to the petitioners unless it is accompanied by a certificate of proficiency that the Brother proposed as Master is competent to confer the three degrees of Freemasonry in conformity with the Idaho work. Note Section 1603, paragraphs 5 and 6.

Section 1012. Requirements for charter. No charter shall be issued to a new Lodge until it shall have worked a time under dispensation and shall have exhibited to the Grand Lodge satisfactory evidence of this Masonic capability. The question then asked if a lodge no longer retains the ability to conduct Masonry in conformity with the Idaho Code, should that charter be arrested? And I could solve a lot of problems that we had in the last couple of days just by saying, yes, it does. Everybody would need to turn their charter because I'm sure about 90% of our lodges can't do 100% of work on our own. But that's not our decision. Looking at the time this section was written, Masonry was in another direction. There was no discussion about learning the lectures and becoming proficient. It was an expectation and considered an honor to be able to learn and improve themselves in Masonry. Times have changed, as well as requirements to be a Lodge officer. Although this committee believes the writers intended that everyone would continue to learn the lessons and would continue to remain proficient in the work, this committee also believes that it can't make decisions based on assumptions. This section does not cover any method or requirement for a Lodge to remain proficient after obtaining a charter. It does state that a Lodge must show satisfactory evidence that it can do the work, but there is no provision, duty, or responsibility assigned to anyone to verify the work. Therefore, this Committee decides that Article10 and 11 pertain to new lodges only. Since this section is ambiguous and open to interpretation, the Committee recommends that this question be forwarded to the committee that is looking at the Constitution to address this issue as they deem appropriate. We would like to congratulate the Grand Master on a most successful year, and we know that this Grand Lodge of Idaho is better for its efforts that he put into it. Jurisprudence Committee would like to thank you for the opportunity to serve you on this committee, and I especially appreciate you appointing me as Chairman.

Deputy Grand Master Report 2023-2024 Idaho Grand Lodge Year

Brethren of the Idaho Grand Lodge, it has been a true pleasure to represent the Grand Lodge of Idaho as your Deputy Grand Master for 2023-2024!

As I began my year as Deputy Grand Master, the reality of becoming Grand Master of Idaho in one short year finally hit me. I had already started designing my pin and tie as well as beginning the task of planning the visit schedule I would follow beginning in September 2024 but addressing the multitude of details is daunting.

My service as a member of the Portland Shrine Hospital Board of Governors is in its 9th year in 2024, which means I will go off the Board in December. Grand Lecturer's Report

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren,

It has been an honor to serve as Grand Lecturer again this year. I truly enjoy traveling to the districts, experiencing different Lodges, visiting with the brethren, and assisting with the ritual work. I extend my gratitude to all the district deputies for their efforts in securing venues and arranging meals for the ritual workshops. The interactions, hospitality, and brotherhood among the brethren at these meetings were exceptional, embodying the finest qualities of Freemasonry.

Two meetings stood out this year: those in Gooding and Malad. Despite being somewhat remote, each of these meetings had more than twenty brothers in attendance, and both were exceptional.

The primary focus for this year's workshops was the first degree. We covered the floor work for opening, closing, and selected portions of the degree, and we also discussed some of the lessons associated with the first degree.

We connected the building of King Solomon's Temple with the construction of our own spiritual temples. Here is the relevant passage from the Bible:

"And the house, when it was in building, was built of stone made ready before it was brought thither: so that there was neither hammer nor axe nor any tool of iron heard in the house, while it was in building." - 1 Kings 6:7 (KJV)

The absence of the sound of axe, hammer, or any tool of iron is symbolic, representing the quiet and harmonious manner in which we should conduct our work and personal development. It suggests precision, skill, and harmony among the workers. This symbolizes the importance of diligence, discipline, and contemplative work in Freemasonry. Just as the Temple was built without the noise and discord of iron tools, we should build our own characters in a peaceful and contemplative manner, free from tumultuous thoughts and actions.

We also discussed the reference to the book of Ruth in the ritual. Here is an excellent article on the book of Ruth as it relates to the plucking off of the shoe: <u>Ceremony of the Shoe: A Ritual of God's Ancient Covenant People.</u>

Jurisprudence Committee

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, and Brethren.

The following are the preliminary rulings and decisions of the Jurisprudence Committee on Resolutions, Constitutional Amendments and Questions received for clarification. All Resolutions and Constitutional Amendments were received on time and in order. After consideration, the following decisions were made,

The amendments are numbered below only for clarification purposes. Actual numbers will be issued by the Grand Secretary prior to being sent to the Lodges.

- The Constitutional amendment change submitted by Mt. Moriah members was received on February 7, 2024. This amendment changes Idaho constitution Article III Officers: Section 3.
 The constitution amendment is in order and since it changes the constitution is not in conflict. It will be referred to the Grand Master with the recommendation that he has it read and sent to the lodges for consideration in accordance with Article VI Amendments Section 1.
- 2 Resolution from the Code and Digest Review Committee, received on February 14, 2004. This resolution changes Article 1 General Provisions: section 103, Annual Communication. This simplifies where the Grand Lodge will be held based on area. It changes paragraph 1 only, 2 and 3 and the remaining parts will remain It is not in conflict. And will be presented to the delegates for consideration at Grand Lodge.
- 3 Resolution from the Code and Digest Review Committee received on February 14, 2004. This resolution changes Regulation 10, Concordant and appendant orders, Clubs, and associations. It changes how we recognize other Concurrent, appendant bodies and clubs. It simplifies the process and breaks down the categories they fall under. It is not in conflict and will be presented to the delegates for consideration at Grand Lodge,
- 4 Resolution from three voting members of Grand Lodge, received February 13, 2024. The resolution changes Article III, Powers and Duties of Grand Officers, Section 303, Deputy Grand Master. This resolution adds an additional duty to the Deputy Grand Master. It is not in conflict and will be presented to the delegates for consideration at Grand Lodge,
- 5 Resolution from three members of Paradise Lodge received January 26, 2024. This resolution changes Article 39, Monitor. Bullet Point #2. It will authorize the reading of the lectures under certain circumstances. It is not in conflict and **will be presented** to the delegates for consideration at Grand Lodge
- This resolution was submitted by four voting members of Grand Lodge, received on February 14, 2024. This resolution adds section 804 to Article VIII and allows for streaming lectures. It is not in conflict and will be submitted to the delegates for consideration.
- 7 Thiis resolution was submitted by four voting members of Grand Lodge, received on February 15, 2024. This resolution adds section 1106 Occasional Lodges to Article XI Chartered Lodges. and authorized the formation of an occasional lodge. It is not in conflict and will be submitted to the delegates for consideration.

- This resolution was submitted by Mt. Moriah Lodge. It was received on February 7.2004. This resolution Changes Article XVIII, Section 1892 Vacancy in Office. This resolution authorizes the Grand Treasurer to hold office in a constituent Lodge. This conflicts with Article III of the constitution, the authors state they know it is in conflict but want it submitted and if passed it would be placed on hold until the new constitutional amendment is decided. Article XXXIV Section 3401, paragraph 4 sub-paragraph 3. Legislation affecting the By-laws or Regulations becomes effective at the close of the communication at which they are adopted, there is no provision in the code for approving legislation and then placing it on hold until an amendment is approved. The resolution, conflicting with the current constitution, has been returned and will not be submitted to the delegates for consideration.
- 9 This resolution was submitted by four voting members of Grand Lodge. It was received February 14, 2024

This resolution changes XVI section 1603 paragraph 4. This resolution changes the requirements to become a Worshipful Master. 1603 Paragraphs 5 and 6 set the requirements for becoming a Worshipful Master, since this resolution changes paragraph 4 allowing those with a warden certificate to become a master without a master's certificate. This is a third way a member can become a master. It is not in conflict and will be proposed to the delegates for consideration,

10.. This resolution was submitted by Mt, Moriah Lodge. It was received on February 7. It changes Article XVI Officers, Elections, Installation, Section 1603 Paragraph 3, Eligibility of Officers, this changes the eligibility of the Grand Treasurer and authorizes him to be an elected Officer in a constituent Lodge. The authors state they know it is in conflict but want it submitted and if passed it would be placed on hold until the new constitutional amendment is decided. This Article XXXIV Section 3401, paragraph 4 sub-paragraph 3. Legislation affecting the By-laws or Regulations becomes effective at the close of the communication at which they are adopted. There is no provision in the code for approving legislation and then placing it on hold until an amendment is approved. This resolution, conflicting with the current constitution, has been returned and will not be submitted to the delegates for consideration.

The Jurisprudence committee received several questions for clarification, and the response given is as follows.

The following questions were submitted to the Jurisprudence Committee for clarification.

1. The problem, a lodge received a petition for plural membership at a stated meeting, the Master received the petition, appointed an investigating committee. He then wanted to call free from restraint, investigate the brother and then vote on his membership in the same meeting, they stated there is no requirement to wait 30 days. Their argument is that paragraph 6 is unclear since it states If the petitioner is eligible, the petition received, and the petitioner later elected. Their argument is that he is not affiliated, he is joining as a plural member. And the word later elected does not give a time limit.

Their belief is unfounded for the following reasons.

The first two lines of 1412 state a Master Mason desiring to **affiliate** as a plural member., will submit a **petition** for Plural membership, this shows that a member is petitioning the lodge.

Paragraph five states that if a member is eligible then the lodge petitioned may receive the petition (Reg 47) This paragraph refers to regulation forty-seven on receiving petitions for plural members.

Regulation forty-seven controls Petitions, A petition is filed when received by the Secretary. A petition is received only after it is read at a stated meeting and declared received by the Worshipful Master. It then refers to section 2010.

Section 2010. Affiliation. A petition for affiliation shall be in writing and signed by the petitioner with his full name. It shall state his age, occupation and place of residence and shall show whether or not he is applying for Plural Membership. It shall be accompanied by a Demit or its equivalent, or a satisfactory explanation in writing why it cannot be obtained. It may be received regardless of where the petitioner resides, but he must satisfy the usual requirements of reception, reference and balloting that apply to petitions for the degrees. (Revised Sept. 1995) (See Investigation Form.)

It further states that at the time of submitting his application it shall be accompanied by either a demit, some other equivalent, (letter of good standing if not demitting from other lodge) satisfactory reason one cannot be obtained,

Section 2004. Petition for Degrees, Reception and Reference. No Lodge shall receive a petition for the degrees except by unanimous consent of the members present. When so received it shall be referred by the Master to an investigating committee consisting of three members, appointed in open Lodge, who shall file their report thereon with the Secretary within a month, unless further time be granted. **The Secretary shall not present the said report to the Lodge before one month has elapsed after the reception of the petition**. If the committee is not doing its duty in investigating or reporting, the Master should appoint others in place of any or all members of the committee, but such appointees shall be given sufficient time to make their investigation. The investigating committee shall ascertain and report the following facts regarding the applicant and no other special questionnaire is permissible. (Note: See Regulation 68.)

- 1. What is his age?
- 2. Is he married or single?
- 3. If married, is he living with his wife?
- 4. What is his occupation and where is he employed?
- 5. Is he physically qualified for admission?
- 6. What is the character of his company and associates?
- 7. Is he physiologically or psychologically addicted to the use of mind-altering drugs (e.g., alcohol, opiates, barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens?) (Revised Sept. 1975)
- 8. Is he a compulsive gambler?
- 9. Does he habitually use profane or indecent language
- 10, Has he licentious or immoral habits?
- 11. Is he a law-abiding citizen?
- 12. Does he have sufficient education and intelligence to understand and value the doctrines and tenets of Masonry?
- 13. Has he ever made previous application for the degrees, and if so, where, and when? 456214. State any other facts of value to the Lodge in arriving at a correct conclusion This satisfies the question about joining as a plural member, (If he is requesting to join a lodge as a plural member, he is in fact petitioning that lodge, and petitions must be handled in accordance with regulation 47 and by-laws article XX, 2004.

Decision:

1402 is correct and not confusing with the word later in paragraph six. Paragraph six contains instructions on what the secretary must do if the member is elected and has no bearing on how the

petition will be received and managed. A member petitioning for plural membership is requesting to join a lodge and his petition will be managed in accordance with 2010 and 2004.

- 2. A request for information on what a lodge needed to do to change its name. No decision was necessary because the Lodge decided not to change its name.
- 3. A question was submitted requesting information concerning resolution six. Was it in conflict with Article III?

Article III states only Past masters who have been issued a Worshipful Masters certificate of proficiency are qualified as permanent members of Grand Lodge. Resolution six will not be in conflict because it provides another way for a brother to obtain a Worshipful Masters certificate. It this passes then once a brother serves his term as warden, the DDGM will be required to submit a request for a Master's certification, to the Grand Secretary . Upon receipt of the certificate, he will then be eligible for election and is in compliance with article III by having obtained a certificate.

A recent request for a ruling on By-laws Article X section 1004 and 1012 Certificate of Proficiency.

This article pertains to obtaining a charter for a new lodge. Section 1004 states No dispensation shall be issued unless it is accompanied by a certificate of proficiency that the brother proposed as master is competent to confer the three degrees of Masonry. Section 1012 Requirements for a Charter No charter shall be issued to a new lodge until it shall have worked a time under dispensation and shall have exhibited to the Grand Lodge satisfactory evidence of its masonic capability. If the lodge is no longer able to meet this requirement should their charter be arrested.

This question is overly complex and will have a great consequence for the Grand Lodge based on its findings. The committee is still researching and will be holding discussions on an appropriate ruling. The final ruling or suggestion will be included in the final report at Grand Lodge.

401.4 Fraternal Relations Committee

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, and Members of the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM:

We, your committee on Fraternal Relations, begs to report the following:

It was requested that we review past proceedings to determine if proper action was taken on recommendations for recognition. The following recommended recognitions appear to not have been adopted.

- D. At the 148th Annual Communication held on September 17th, 18th, and 19th 2015, the Fraternal Relations Committee reported the following:
 - 5. On December 15, 2014, a request for recognition from the M. W. Grand Lodge of Albania was received. The Grand Lodge of Albania consecrated on October 14, 2011 in Tirana by the Grand Orient of Italy. It is composed of three lodges previously warranted by the Grand Orient of Italy. It has adopted the Ritual and Book of Constitution of the Grand Orient, the Principles for Grand Lodges Recognition accepted by the United Grand Lodge of England, as well as the "Aims and Relationships of the Craft" of the UGLE. The CIR is of the opinion that the Grand Lodge of Albania meets the standards for recognition. Based on this information your committee recommends that their request for recognition be granted.
 - 6. On February 1, 2015, a request for recognition from the M. W. Gran Logia Simbólica del Paraguay was received. Over the last six years, the CIR has continued to study the split in the Grand Lodge of Paraguay that resulted in the two Grand Lodges. Based on their investigation, they have been lead to the conclusion that the Grand Lodge Symbolic whose Grand Master is M/W Bro Euclides, is the only Grand Lodge in Paraguay that meets the standards for recognition. Based on this information your committee recommends that their request for recognition be granted.

We move that these recognition recommendations be adopted.

- E. At the 152nd Annual Communication held on September 19th, 20th, and 21st, 2019, the Fraternal Relations Committee reported the following:
 - 2. The Grand Orient of Minas Gerais and The Grand Oriente De Mato Grosso Do Sul have both sent letters requesting recognition. The 2019 Report of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America States: "Brazil State Grand Orients, The Grande Orient de Minas Gerais and the Grand Oriente de Mato Grosso do Sul were each recognized by and treaties signed with their respective State Grand Lodges in 2018. Each of these bodies are also recognized by the CMI. It would be reasonable to assume that these grand orients are practicing regular Masonry, and recognition would be appropriate if you so desire." This Committee recommends that the Grand Lodge of Idaho recognize The Grand Orient de Minas Gerais and The Grand Oriente De Mato Grosso Do Sul.

We move that these recognition recommendations be adopted.

- F. During this Masonic Year, we received the following requests for recognition.
 - 3. On March 14, 2024, a letter from the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Georgia headquartered in Tbilisi requesting recognition of their Grand Lodge by the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM. This letter was accompanied by the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Georgia, dated in 2015 as amended; the list of Grand Officers of the Grand Lodge of Georgia; and the 2023 and 2024 reports of the Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand of Grand Masters of North America. The Commission reported in those two years that the Grand Lodge of Georgia meets the requirements for recognition. Therefore, we recommend that the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM grant recognition to the Grand Lodge of Georgia AF&AM.

This request was approved at the 156th Annual Communication. No further action is required.

- 4. On June 3, 2024, a letter from the Grand Secretary for Foreign Affairs of the Grande Oriente do Rio Grande do Norte in Triol, Natal-RN, requesting recognition of their Grand Orient by the Grand Lodge of Idaho AF&AM. The letter was accompanied by a list of the officers of the Grand Orient, a translation of the Constitution of the Grand Orient which lists the principles of the institution, and a translation of the treaty between the Grand Orient of Brazil and the Grand Orient of Rio Grand de Norte allowing to operate within the state. The Commission on Information for Recognition has not reviewed this Grand Orient for compliance. We recommend that this request be held over until next year when the Commission will give a decision.
- D. During this year several communications were received from Grand Lodges that we are in amity with. We received lists of new officers for Grand Lodges, a notice of Expelled/Suspended members of the Grand Lodge of Ukraine making unauthorized communications, an announcement from the United Grand Lodges of Germany suspending communications with the Grand Lodge of Russia, and a decree from the Grand Orient of Italy suspending relations with the Scottish Rite in Italy.

generation the mentorship that they need to help us over the next few years. There is still a great presence of older DeMolays I can call on when necessary, we just need to stop worrying about titles and focus on doing our jobs, which is growth.

Our goals for this year are similar to years past. Focusing squarely on membership, both recruitment and development, Marketing and being an active member of our communities. We are really pushing to get out of the lodge room more and get outside talking to people and promoting DeMolay to the next generation of members (and hopefully new masons in the future).

Our next major event will be our Honors Program on October 26th in Boise, where we will be honoring and Legion of Honor and a Chevalier.

As of the writing of this report, we have initiated 6 new members this year so far with 2-3 more petitions in hand for new members. We will be pushing to get 15 new members for the 2024 calendar year as an achievable goal and something to build on for 2025. Idaho DeMolay currently has roughly 80 members on our rosters, and I think it is very important that we get this number back up over 100 by the end of 2025. It is an attainable goal and something we are challenging everyone involved to help us meet this goal. All support that we can get from Mason's in this Grand Lodge would be greatly appreciated.

In closing, I would like to thank Most Worshipful Grand Master Gary Labruyere, and his Grand Lodge Officers, for the incredible support of all three masonic youth organizations during the last year. The additional attendance by masons at our events has been noticed and well received.

It has been a good year, and we are looking forward to great years to come.

At the 139th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Idaho, Resolution 10 was adopted. This change pertained to Section 1416 of our Code and Digest. 'Voluntary Prepaid Life Membership'.

2. (Price) The single-payment purchase price for a Pre-Paid Life Membership shall be at twenty-one (21) year's annual dues that are in effect on the date of purchase, but not less than \$700. This amount to be adjusted annually in the spring based on the preceding year's inflation.

The cost of living for 2023 was an increase of 3.2%. (For our purpose the amount of increase is rounded to the nearest dollar.)

Therefore, effective January 1, 2024, the minimum cost of a Pre-Paid Life Membership = \$1,068.00.

On behalf of the Investment Committee, I am pleased to submit the following Annual Report for the year August **1**, 2023, to July 31, 2024.

We are pleased to report that the Grand Lodge Investments have recovered from the challenges faced during the 2021 down year. The Grand Lodge investments with Wells Fargo are the combined Grand Lodge Permanent Relief Fund and Interest Relief Fund which are split between the Relief Fund Fixed and Relief Fund Equity and the Grand Lodge Endowment Fund. Our investment advisor, Brother Scott Johnson, with Wells Fargo Advisors, provides monthly reports to the investment committee. During the 2023-2024 Grand Lodge Year the committee met quarterly via Zoom meetings with Brother Scott to review and discuss the quarterly investment reports. The Chairman of the Accounts and Finances the members of the GL Relief Committee and the Pre-Paid Life Trustees were invited to the quarterly meetings.

(revised Sept. 2024)

Rational: Due to lack of proficient individuals, some lodges in our jurisdiction struggle to perform the lectures in a manner fitting the work. While many members are available to assist, there are times in which no one is available. By authorizing the Grand Master, on rare occasions, to permit the lodges to read the lectures, we will be able to prevent delays in the conferring of degrees. Additionally, the Grand Master may even be able to assist in the location of a proficient individual. This resolution does not grant blanket permission to read the lectures, but allows exceptions to be bade, when necessary, on a case by-case-basis. This resolution only allows the reading of the lecture from the Idaho Monitor, not the Written Esoteric Work. It still requires the presenter to learn to read the coded portions and should give him confidence while performing in an open lodge. Any Master's Certificate of Proficiency shall require the lectures to be presented from memory.
